Third Time Lucky?

Striving to Keep the Mitre Standing

The Mitre Tavern was first opened by Major Hornbook in 1848 as a sly grog shop. It was well in business when the first four sailing ships arrived in Lyttelton. The premises are noted as the first pub in Canterbury and probably the first commercial premises.

According to the history books, the Mitre Tavern has already had three lives. The first in 1849 when Major Alfred Hornbrook had the hotel commissioned and built. Initially it was the only sizeable establishment in Lyttelton and hosted all the important early meetings in the settlement. This establishment survived the great fire in 1870 only to be consumed by flames in 1875.

The then new Mitre was much grander than the last. Again constructed out of wood the hotel boasted a Kauri paneled commercial room, billiard room, a range of guest rooms and servants accommodation. The new building was proudly opened for business in September 1876.

Tragically fire was to beset the hotel again. In July 1926 the wooden building was gutted. The current, and third, Mitre building is in fact a concrete structure not brick as commonly thought. It is for this reason, that it has survived the earthquakes. The building is a California mission style art deco building, and is an early example of use of modern concrete.

The September 2010 earthquake resulted in mainly non-structural damage to the lath and plaster ceilings and walls. The main fireplace and chimney in the upstairs lounge were damaged although still stood. In the bar there were some wall cracks near both toilet facilities.

The February 2011 earthquake was devastating in Lyttelton. The west wall moved out 150mm and upstairs was basically trashed. The main chimney and fireplace collapsed.

Within ten days structural engineers had managed to pull in both bowing walls and stabilised the building with the use of thick steel cable and turfers. The walls were effectively tied back to internal elements of the building.

This technique was pioneered on other heritage buildings after the September 2010 earth-quake. It was highly effective and prevented further damage to these walls from aftershocks. The Mitre Hotel was intending to reopen the bar but structural engineers assessed the damage as unsafe for a public building.

The June 2011 earthquake caused further damage, with the north wall incurring a serious degree of damage. The gas brick fire place collapsed in the bar.

The existing Mitre Hotel building has a heritage Category 2 classification. Structural engineers are assessing all possible options for the repair of the building. The likely solutions so far are strengthening the street facing walls with Shotcrete [the process of conveying concrete or mortar through a hose, pneumatically projected at high velocity onto a surface] and bracing with a steel internal structure. North and west walls may need to be rebuilt.

There is an enormous amount of capital involved in such a repair and earthquake strengthening project. It is well beyond the cover offered by insurance. To make the repair and recovery project more viable it is intended to establish four residential apartments on the first floor. This could be a welcome accommodation addition to a new and vibrant Lyttelton. There are however major town planning hurdles and Building Act issues that can make restoration extremely difficult.

Both the building owner and publican have sustained severe personal loss from the earthquakes. It just strengthens their resolve to move forward.

Cruise Ships Diverted To Akaroa

Disheartening News for Lyttelton Harbour Tourism and Business

The Summer cruise season normally gets underway in October and usually runs through to early April, with the peak cruise period over January and February. In 2009/10 LPC hosted a total of 50 cruise ships. Over 100,000 passengers and crew arrived in Lyttelton, and toured Canterbury during the season, mainly from America, Australia and the United Kingdon¹.

At the end of May 2011, the Lyttelton Port of Christchurch released figures showing 64 cruise vessels were scheduled to call at Lyttelton over the 2011/2012 cruise season. Denoting that this would have been Port Lyttelton's busiest cruise season, even despite some early cancellations as a result of the February earthquake.

Six months after the February earthquake, and at this stage 29 vessels will now be berthing at Akaroa, with the remaining 35 vessels unconfirmed for berthing in Lyttelton. Christchurch and Canterbury Tourism have specifically organised to transfer tourists from Akaroa directly to Hagley Park - leaving few options for tourists to access the Lyttelton Harbour region.

Melanie McAtamney from the Lyttelton Port Company confirms what is already known - the Lyttelton Port has sustained substantial damage to Cashin Quay No.1 and Cashin Quay No.2. What is less known is that as a consequence of the damage caused by the earthquakes, the level of service that the Lyttelton Port Company can offer visiting cruise ships is considered less than ideal. The Lyttelton Port Company has requested the cruise lines provide advice on what level of service they are comfortable with for the coming season. For example, are they comfortable to call into Lyttelton with the damage we have, and more importantly are they comfortable for passengers to transit into Lyttelton. While the port company can immediately repair some areas, other areas cannot be repaired in time.

Despite assurances from the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre that Lyttelton, and the surrounding harbour region, still has plenty to offer tourists - the Lyttelton Port Company have commented that the main cruise liners have indicated that they are very concerned about the "free independent travellers" - they don't wish for them to be at risk, and are concerned what they will actually do in Lyttelton and Christchurch.

As a positive, Black Cat Cruises have confirmed they are gearing up for a bumper cruise ship season in Akaroa this summer. Having confirmed 22 cruise vessel visits starting from October to April - including the Volendam, The World, Oceanic Discoverer, Dawn and Diamond Princess, Pacific Pearl and others².

Yet on the other hand, the Lyttelton business district relies on the cruise ship and Summer tourism trade. News such as this will leave the main street in a precarious position through until the next season in October 2012.

Neighbourhood Week

29 October to 6 November 2011

Neighbourhood Week is a week dedicated to getting to know the people who live close to you. It's about bringing people together – whether it's a small get together of a few households or a larger neighbourhood gathering. The week is an ideal opportunity to introduce yourself to your neighbours. Getting to know your neighbours can make the difference between merely occupying an address and living in a neighbourhood of friends.

Who are my neighbours?

A neighbourhood could also be a small group of families at a local kindergarten, kohanga reo or school who share a common desire to build a strong community with each other. Neighbourhood Week is a festival that celebrates the unique and diverse flavour that is characteristic of each individual neighbourhood.

How did Neighbourhood Week start?

Neighbourhood Week is the brainchild of the Shirley-Papanui Community Board, which held the first event in 1998. Each year, it has grown to the point that it is now being promoted annually by the Christchurch City Council and nationwide by Neighbourhood Support. The Christchurch Neighbourhood Week Team works closely with Neighbourhood Support.

A small subsidy towards cost for Neighbourhood Week is currently allocated by each of the city ward community boards for allocation to help support Neighbourhood Week events. The following criteria applies:

- intention of support
- number of people per event
- residents' association

- dates of events
- conflict of events
- community board re-imbursement

Intention of support

Neighbourhood Week funding is seen as a small contribution towards holding an event. Because it is intended to 'bring neighbours together' applications from individuals getting together and holding a local event will take priority over organisations.

Dates of events

While there are set dates for Neighbourhood Week, we understand that not all events can take place within designated dates. If you wish to have your event outside these dates, please provide an explanation on your application form. Please note priority will be given to events that fall within Neighbourhood Week as opposed to other times of the year.

Numbers of people per event

While there are no limitations on numbers attending Neighbourhood Week events, it should be remembered that the main purpose of Neighbourhood Week is to bring neighbours together to get to know each other and therefore events with too small or too large numbers may be less successful in achieving this.

Curried Vegetable Pancakes

Quick, healthy and tasty - these savoury pancakes will be a favourite in no time.

- 200g carrot or pumpkin, grated
- 2 large potatoes, grated
- 1 onion, grated
- ½ cup sour cream
- ½ cup milk (soy or rice is fine)
- 1/3 cup flour (or use chickpea flour, rice flour or potato flour)
- 2 tsp curry powder
- 1 tsp cassia
- 1 tsp mace
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- sunflower oil for shallow frying

Place vegetables in a colander and set over a bowl to drain, squeeze to remove as much excess moisture as possible.

Place all ingredients in a bowl and combine.
Heat the oil in a large frying pan.

Drop tablespoons of mix into the hot oil and cook for 2-3 minutes on each side until golden.

Drain and serve sprinkled with fenugreek sprouts.

Contra Dance Comes to Lyttelton

Just Have a Go - Have Some Fun!

Together with Roger Buckton and the band "Folkworks", local contra dance enthusiast Bill Baritompa has organised a dance event for the good folk of Lyttelton, the Harbour Basin, and beyond. A contra dance is very similar to a barn dance. No experience is needed. No partners are needed. It is really easy. Bill is a very experienced dance caller and teacher. It will be a very open, inclusive environment geared to having a good time.

What is Contra Dance? Contra dancing is social interaction, meeting people, and making new friends, set to music. Contra is danced to all sorts of music played by live bands. In a contra dance, parallel lines of dancers stand opposite, or *contra* to, their partners. In response to the *caller's* instructions, each couple interacts with the couple next to them to form a four person *set* and each set interacts with the sets on either side of them. Very little footwork is required in contra dance. The most common type of movement is a smooth walking step and the caller teaches each dance before it is actually done to the music.

Worried About Being New at This? Don't be. You will be in good company. Beginners are always welcome at Contra dances; prior experience is not expected. So grab your dance shoes and come on out for your first dose of Contra Dance! If you make a mistake or miss a figure, no worries! Relax, have fun and remember: it's only a dance!

Art in the Park

Orton Bradley

ARTSPACE is focused on establishing Orton Bradley Park as an arts event location. The inspiration for **ARTSPACE** grew from a hui held in mid-November 2010, exploring ideas around developing the Park as a centre for sustainability in Canterbury.

From a visual arts perspective the long-term vision is to develop areas of Orton Bradley Park into a permanent public-access art space, which will include an arts trail of national and international standing. Alongside this development there will be a variety of arts workshops, including visual arts, music, and theatre, facilitated by experienced and talented artists and craftspeople throughout the year.

Planning is now well under way for the second Art in the Park event for 2011 will be held on the weekend of 26-27 November over at Orton Bradley Park. While still light on specifics Art in the Park organiser Trent Hiles, is pleased to be able to confirm the following workshops:

Print Making - Mono printing to build up several layers of colour. And the collograph method involved creating a plate of different textures.

Earth Paint

Whatu Weaving - Learning the finger twining technique used for making cloakes, or korowai.

Raranga - Learn about the process of gathering and preparing harakeke [flax] for weaving; with the Autumn series teaching students to create he putiputi (a flower), he kono (a four corner basket), he kete (a bag), and he waikawa (a potato basket).

Wood Carving - Gain knowledge of the origins of the patterns used, and the origins and stories of items made; together with tool use and working with different timbers.

If you would like to run a workshop please get in contact with Trent – as it would be great to offer a variety of experiences, and it doesn't have to be visual arts. Musicians, thespians, dancers, craft-artists - everyone is welcome to make an offer. Ultimately, if there is the space, Trent is determined to make it work.

Alternatively, if you have an idea for a workshop that you would like to attend that has not been mentioned then let Trent know those ideas too. The plan is to also hold a music-picnic lunch on the Sunday afternoon, with a chance for 'the public' to possibly look at some of the work being done in the afternoon. There are plenty of ideas to finalise, but do lodge these dates in your diary. If you want to get your name down for a workshop you can let Trent know now as well - the list has already started.

In the Referendum, you will be asked two questions:

- The first question asks whether you want to keep MMP (which is the voting system we use at the moment) or whether you want to change to another voting system.
- The second question asks which of four other voting systems you would choose if New Zealand decides to change from the Mixed Member Proportional (MMP) system:
 - First Past the Post (FPP)
 - Preferential Vote (PV)
 - Single Transferable Vote (STV)
 - Supplementary Member (SM)

Relocating Abandoned Homes

Site Identified in Governors Bay

The Red Zone Heritage Housing Association is a not-for-profit organization for home owners in Christchurch. They are trying to save old (approximately 100 years) 'repairable' homes in the Residential Red Zone.

The plan is to move these houses and their owners to a new location where the homes can be repaired and rejuvenated. By negotiating with CERA as a group they believe that they can obtain the best possible outcome for both the houses and their owners.

A property identified at 156 Main Road, Governors Bay is the sort of area that might be suitable for development into a heritage housing area. The asking price is \$900,000 for 8.7 hectares of land in Governor's Bay.


Using the layout suggested by the Red Zone Heritage Housing Association this could be used to site twenty-eight heritage houses on 2000 m² sections, as well as two public squares, each of 6650m², and a couple of community buildings.

At this purchase price, the cost per house could be around \$32,000. Even allowing for legal costs and service connection this is still enormously cheaper than buying land anywhere else, and demonstrates the value of developing the properties ourselves on a not-for-profit basis.



What is Time Banking?

Time Banking is a way of trading skills in a community. It uses time, rather than money, as the measurement tool. Members of a Time Bank share their skills with other members within the community and are given time credits for the work they do. With the credits they gain, each member can 'buy' someone else's time, and get the service they need.

Why Join Lyttelton Time Bank?

Time Banking adds a richness to Time Bankers' lives. As a concept it brings 'wealth', in the form of friendship, caring for one another, having our needs met from within our own community and getting help with things we can't do. Skills that are often taken for granted are valued - especially non-market economy skills - like mothering, basic home help and caring, friendliness, listening.

In Lyttelton as a result of the Time Bank we can see a tighter community forming. Friendships are forming between people of different backgrounds who would not usually have met. The elderly are being cared for and the skills they share are valued. Special needs people are encouraged to participate. Time Banking builds relationships and trust in a community. Everyone has something they can contribute to the wellbeing of the whole.

Everyone's Time is Equal

With Time Banking everybody's time is equal, no matter what type of work is done. 1 = 1. If you give one hour's work, you receive one hour time credit. If you have another member do one hour's work, they are paid one hour time credit. Every person is equally valued.
