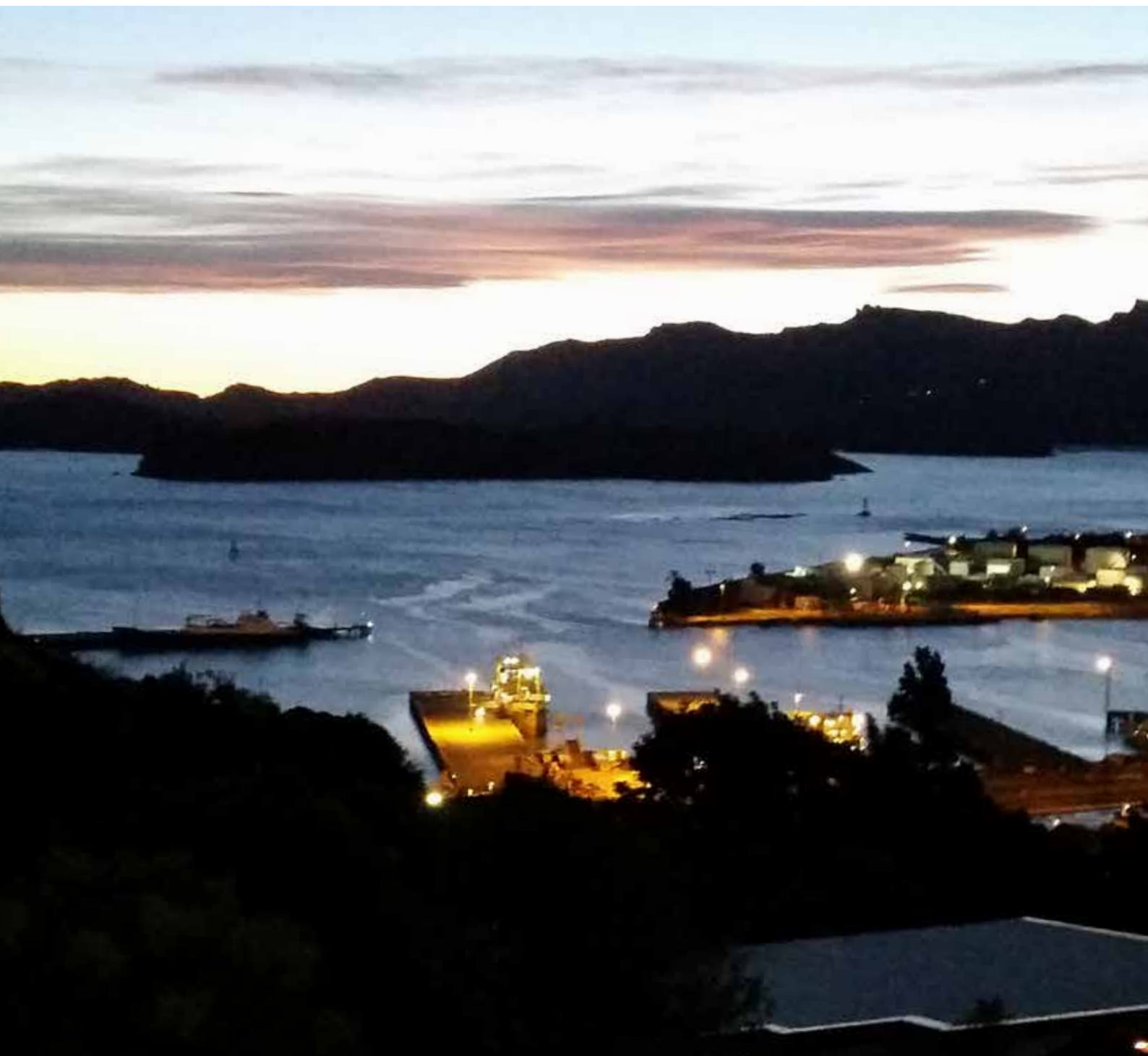

Chance Encounters Lyttelton's Magic Shines

Sometime in July if my memory is correct Margaret Jefferies posted an accommodation request on the Lyttelton Timebank. A student from Portland Oregon was coming to New Zealand and she wanted to spend her first New Zealand experiences in Lyttelton learning about Project Lyttelton.

How did this student hear about us? Turns out that earlier in the year there had been an Environmental Conference organised by Mt Pleasant's Jocelyn Pappill. One of the activities of the conference was

a field trip to Lyttelton. Environmental Educator, Greg Smith also from the USA participated in the field trip. Margaret Jefferies hosted the team and told them all the interesting things that were happening in this community. Greg returned to the USA and after learning that a student was keen to visit New Zealand for some place based community learning he recommended she get in touch with Project Lyttelton and the next thing Kara Scherer arrived.

"I am an environmental studies student with a focus on place-based education" she said. That fitted perfectly with the work of Project Lyttelton. Her Lyttelton journey began with a Timebank accommodation match. Mia Michel-Bouchet decided to open up her home to Kara. She'd never had an unknown stranger stay in her home before. From the moment Kara arrived Mia and her two son's Jule and Merlin have loved having Kara around. She's actively engaged with them. A stay of only two weeks has ended up being months! Kara's become like their adopted sister. It was a great deal for everyone. Kara helped around the house and especially in the school holidays she was invaluable helping out with activities. She's taught the boys cooking, cut their hair and taken them out and in return our community has had a very willing helper.

"I've experienced Project Lyttelton first hand". That was the entire reason for my visit. You might be surprised to know that apart from the desire to experience place based education nothing else was planned before she arrived in Lyttelton. "My entire journey has been very serendipitous" she said. "This was a journey where I was open to any opportunities that came my way"

In her first week she helped at the Farmers Market, did surveys at the garage sale and got involved at the community garden. She then helped plant trees on a local reserve whilst learning all about the biodiversity and the uniqueness of the surrounding plant life. Next minute she was invited to one of Gary Moore's Tuesday Night Clubs where she saw local grass roots democracy in action and learnt many interesting things about the Christchurch rebuild.

"Working with Project Lyttelton gave me a real sense of what it means to be a community. From the moment I arrived until this day, I have met some truly inspiring leaders who, through their actions, have taught me the meanings of resilience and perseverance. I will be returning home inspired and motivated."

Her whole journey has been peppered with many interesting experiences and she's going back to Portland with a host of ideas. Her New Zealand experience has been so positive that she's counting down for when she can return again.

An initiative supporting our local businesses. Lyttelton vouchers can be purchased for cash at the Lyttelton Information Centre. They come in 20 dollar denominations and the idea is you purchase vouchers and then redeem at various businesses around the harbour. The scheme has been running for two years and was developed initially by Project Lyttelton, as an earthquake recovery/resilience project. Now it is administered by the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre. The scheme has been quite popular so it's been adopted as a regular way to support business and keep money circulating within our local economy.

Vouchers can be redeemed at most businesses but please note they expire after six months.

Working Men's Club Lyttelton

The repairs to our Club's building at 16 Canterbury Street, Lyttelton are on-going and, when the repairs are complete, we intend to reopen the building as a purpose built theatre, music, arts and events venue. The Club known as the Loons was formed during the 1951 waterfront dispute and is a not for profit incorporated society with a social equity objective to support the arts in Lyttelton.

Funding for the repairs to our building has come from insurance proceeds, grants, donations and sponsorships to date. When the Club commenced, the project costs and quantities were calculated by a registered quantity surveyor at \$2,900,000. The Club is now two thirds of the way through the repairs with the structural strengthening and retaining work complete and heating system installed. The cost to date is \$1,100,000 and the revised completion target has come down to \$2,100,000. We have made good savings from careful management and the great support of suppliers and trades people but still have the task of raising \$1,000,000 to complete the project.

The funding committee has met weekly for the past five months working on all aspects needed to complete the final stage of the building work.

The Club's volunteer committee has put in a huge effort focusing on how the Club will function once open and this community asset makes a return to Lyttelton. The Club has revised its constitutional objectives which are now based around supporting the arts in perpetuity. We have entered into very productive discussions with a team experienced in event management and social enterprise delivery and are committed to seeing the top floor of the building used for this purpose. This is not the Theatre Trust that formerly operated from the building. The basement area will be reserved for use by the Club and other organisations. We have a strong desire to make the building available for community functions, private or public.

This will place increasing financial obligations on the Club and its membership.

There may be some misunderstanding as to the grant of \$250,000 made to the Club from the Christchurch City Council Mayoral Fund in 2012. This money was granted specifically for the rebuild of the Loons Theatre building at 16 Canterbury Street. The funds were paid into our solicitor's trust account and used solely for this rebuild to the satisfaction of the Christchurch City Council.

We are determined that our building will be finished and look forward to completion of the project as a major community asset in Lyttelton. Please do not hesitate to visit our website on www.lwmc.org.nz.

Summer Hazards and Reminders

FIRE RESTRICTIONS IMPOSED FOR RURAL AND URBAN AREAS

A combination of warm temperatures and the lack of rain has prompted fire restrictions for rural Christchurch, and a ban on outdoor fires in the urban fire district from 29/11/2015.

Outdoor fires are banned in urban areas until further notice Christchurch City Council Rural Fire Manager Murray Sinclair says that permits are now needed to light any type of outdoor fire other than a barbeque in the Christchurch Rural Fire District area, which includes Banks Peninsula.

There is also a ban on all outdoor burning in the Urban Fire District until further notice, except for hangis, barbeques and umus. These are allowed if they are adequately supervised and there is a pressurised water supply immediately at hand.

People wanting a permit can call the Christchurch City Council Call-Centre on 941 8999, or 0800 800 169 for Banks Peninsula residents. Permits take up to three days to process, and a Rural Fire Officer visits the site of the proposed burn before a permit is granted.

GET-A WAY KIT

If you have to leave your home suddenly it's a good idea to have some key things to grab easily. Spare clothing, important documents, medication, radio, phone are a few of the things you might want to have handy.

EMERGENCY WATER SUPPLIES

It's probably a good time to refresh your stored water for unexpected events. Water lasts for one year. Your gardens will appreciate the old water at this time of the year.

Authorities recommend having three litres of water per person per day. Water can be stored in fruit juice or large soft drink bottles. Do not use white plastic containers used for milk.

It's a good idea to label your water containers with the date you put in new supplies. That way you'll know when your supplies are due for a change.

What's News Councillor Turner

REPRESENTATION REVIEW

On November 20th the City Council voted on what their preferred new governance arrangements for the next election would be. In a very close vote the final scheme submitted to the Local Government Commission was that the Banks Peninsula remain as one area with one councillor and one community board rather than the current two Community Boards. The final proposal sees each subdivision have two community board representatives with the exception of Wairewa that will have only one. That translates to one councillor and 7 community board members for our area.

In Lyttelton Harbour this means we would have two community board representatives from the Lyttelton area and two from the Mount Herbert area.

"I believe the Peninsula has done very well to get a proposal like this supported by the council.", said Andrew.

The Local Government Commission is now taking submissions on objections to the final proposal. You have until December 20th to make your views known.

RESERVE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEES

Andrew has been really keen to get the local community participating effectively in their local area. One of the ways he has promoted this is by supporting existing and new local Reserve Management Committees. Around our harbour there are five committees. "In Lyttelton we have the Lyttelton Reserves Management Committee, Lyttelton Recreation Ground Reserve Management Committee and the Cass Bay Reserve Management Committee. Further afield is the Allandale Reserve Management Committee and the Diamond Harbour Reserves Management Committee" he said.

Each committee is a sub-committee of the Community Board with delegated authority to manage the reserve on behalf of the community. Andrew's philosophy is each committee should have the freedom to achieve their desired goals. For some committees this means managing all aspects of the reserve for others it may mean handing this responsibility to council staff. "You have the flexibility to decide what works best for you".

Unfortunately, of late the committees have become problematic in their governance purely because someone in council believes the committees should not have their own bank accounts even though several

committees have operated them for years. Proposals are being put forward for new ideas of governance which in most cases seem very problematic. In the meantime, boards are becoming destabilised with uncertainty.

"If we want to work meaningfully with our community we need to do it in a way that respects our community and that clarifies the relationship between the council and its committees" he said.

To make the path forward clearer Andrew is arranging a meeting prior to Christmas of all the relevant parties.

RESERVES AND GENERAL MAINTENANCE

Quite a few residents have been ringing Andrew directly about maintenance issues. Whether it be long grass, blocked drains it seems the hand over from City Care contractors to Delta hasn't gone as smoothly as expected. "Not all the jobs that were handed over in the contract were documented properly. This has seen the new contractor unaware of some tasks" he said. Council is sorting the situation out. We believe your requests should be attended to shortly.

TOURISM ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Joining up the dots is part of the reason for investigating how Canterbury Development Corporation, the CCC Events Team and Christchurch Canterbury Tourism can function more effectively. Whilst Andrew isn't entirely sure what the new entity will look like it's hoped in the future a more connected group will avoid duplication.

PORT RECOVERY PLAN

The final Recovery Plan was recently gazetted. "A good outcome is a Harbour Catchment Management Plan that will be developed by the community" he said. This plan will be developed as a subcommittee of the existing ECAN Water Zone Committee.

On a not so positive note he said, "It's disappointing that moving the ferry is now classed as a controlled activity. This changed between the draft and final version of the plan. With so much community input around this issue this is certainly not a great outcome as it means the ferry can be moved at any time".

Christchurch City Council has 100% ownership of Lyttelton Port Company so this seems a very odd outcome. How can the Lyttelton Port Company be able to ignore the wishes of the wider community? Seems it comes down to poorly drafted documents around the City Council's holding company, CCHL. Andrew assures us that in the future this will change. "It is our intent that more effective letters of representation and statements of intent of the council will be drawn up. This will help the city get better balanced outcomes around its Council Controlled Businesses".

Environment Canterbury is currently reviewing the Navigation Safety Bylaw and we have prepared a preliminary draft Navigation Safety Bylaw for pre-consultation. A copy of this can be found at: http://files.ecan.govt.nz/public/draft_nav_safety_bylaw_2016.pdf

As someone interested in boating we would welcome your feedback on this preliminary draft bylaw. This feedback will be considered and taken into account before the draft Bylaw is formally notified. It is expected that a draft bylaw will be adopted by the Council and publically notified around March-April next year for a formal consultation period.

We encourage your feedback at this stage in the process as it allows you to have input into drafting the bylaw and lets us work through any issues collaboratively.

Please note feedback received at this time on the preliminary draft bylaw does not constitute a formal submission on the draft bylaw. A further opportunity to make a formal submission when the draft bylaw is publically notified will also be available to you.

Incorporated Societies Bill

Exposure draft

The Minister of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, Hon Paul Goldsmith, has announced the release of an Exposure Draft of the Incorporated Societies Bill, along with a Request for Submissions. The Request for Submissions also invites comments in relation to Agricultural and Pastoral Societies legislation.

Information and background documents relating to this consultation can be found on the MBIE website.

The closing date for submissions is Thursday 30 June 2016. All submissions should be sent to societies@mbie.govt.nz. Any queries should be sent to the same email address.

The proposals include providing sufficient time (i.e. until 2020) for existing societies to transition from the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 to the new legislation. Our preliminary timeline is summarised in paragraphs 16-17 of the Request for Submissions.

Representation Review 2015

The Council has agreed on its Final Proposal for next year's local elections. The Council has decided on new ward boundaries, community boards and councillor numbers after an extensive review of the city's representation arrangements. It publicly notified the detailed changes on Friday 20 November.

The public then has one month until 4pm Monday 21 December to object or appeal the Council's decision. Features of the Final Proposal on the Representation Review include:

- Banks Peninsula stays as it is.
- Six urban community boards.
- One Banks Peninsula Community Board. 16 wards, with one councillor elected from each of the 16 wards.
- The number of elected members stays the same as at present, at 54.

New Freedom Camping Bylaw in place from 1 December

Christchurch City Council has approved a new Freedom Camping Bylaw to be in place from 1 December 2015.

Consultation on a proposed Freedom Camping Bylaw took place in September.

Councillors Andrew Turner, David East and Glenn Livingstone heard verbal submissions on the proposed bylaw in group discussions. This was a new approach to the hearings process where usually people would have five minutes each to present their views.

In a Council meeting held today, Councillor Turner outlined key changes to the original proposal.

Where self-contained camping in urban areas was restricted under the proposal to three days in a 30-day period, this is now two days.

North Ramp car park in New Brighton was proposed for non-self-contained freedom camping, but the panel decided to prohibit any freedom camping in this area and at South Ramp car park.

No non-self-contained freedom camping is allowed in Akaroa township and Cr Turner said there were many strong submissions about this.

In order to further explore cultural considerations in relation to the bylaw an additional meeting was held with Runanga and this resulted in further restrictions to freedom camping in Rapaki, Birdlings Flat, Onawe, Onuku, Port Levy and Takamatua.

Other areas also had prohibitions extended.

"We want this new bylaw to take affect from 1 December ready for the summer season to prevent a repeat of issues we have seen in past years," Cr Turner said.

Signs will be installed to show where freedom camping is allowed and restrictions that apply.

The Council asked staff to monitor the operation of the Freedom Camping Bylaw 2015 over the coming 2015/16 summer and provide a report to the Regulation and Consents Committee's April 2016 meeting.

Copies of the new Freedom Camping Bylaw 2015 will be available on the Council's website or can be obtained from a Council Service Centre, library or Civic Offices in Hereford Street.

New bylaws are usually reviewed after five years but the Council decided to review the Freedom Camping Bylaw in 2017 so it can manage any unexpected outcomes.

Christchurch Social Enterprise Releases ‘How to Recycle’ Poster

People like to think they’re good at recycling, but the reality is that what is and isn’t recyclable is so confusing that few of us get it completely right. And with high levels of contamination now making headlines, enthusiasts can get quite zealous about the contents of the yellow bin, with whole office wars waged over an un-rinsed bottle of milk.

The new **Recycling in Canterbury** poster by waste prevention consultancy **Our Daily Waste** is here to change all that. Featuring their revolutionary icon-based signage (developed with Pivnice Design), the poster supports the recycling systems of the Christchurch City, Waimakariri District, and Selwyn District Councils, which all deliver recycling to the Eco Drop recovery plant on Parkhouse Road.

Our Daily Waste’s Dr. Sharon McIver explains why the poster (RRP \$10) is for Canterbury only: “Because what is acceptable for recycling is different between regions and waste companies, up until now our systems have been customised according to what is in the clients’ bins. The poster is our way of getting the signage out there at a really affordable price, so it covers the basics and is generic to Christchurch and the surrounding areas.”

“We hope that it will appeal to the eco warriors going through bins, and people who just want to do the right thing. We think it will be perfect for kitchens, staff rooms, classrooms, marae, camping grounds – basically anywhere that has rubbish. It will also make a great ‘secret Santa’ gift.”

Contamination in recycling has now become such a problem that whole bins, skips, trucks and even containers of recycling are getting rejected. “People tell me that they recycle all their plastics, and I really wish they wouldn’t,” says McIver. “The contamination takes all the actual recycling to landfill with it, so it costs more both environmentally and for whoever is paying the waste bills.”

Using the yellow/green/red colour scheme, the poster features individual black and white icons of common rubbish items. Our Daily Waste differs from other recycling signage because it does not use the ‘chasing arrows’ triangle that was established by the US packaging industry to differentiate between plastic types, but which has become the universal symbol for recycling.

“As the film *Bag It* explains that symbol is now misleading,” says McIver. “Now many, many items with the triangle are *not* recyclable, so I consider it one of the greatest blocks towards getting good recycling. It’s time we ditched it.”

Once the poster has been trialled in Canterbury, Our Daily Waste plan to take on other regions, working with local councils and waste contractors to help bin-users across Aotearoa New Zealand reduce both waste and arguments. Wall 1 is 75% complete. 120 soil nails have been installed and the structural shotcrete has been sprayed. In situ concrete still needs to be poured at the area around the stairs and a handrail needs to be installed. Once the construction of wall 1 and wall 2 is complete, the road, kerb and channel will be built. We expect the road construction to be complete early in the new year, at which point we will open this section of the road.

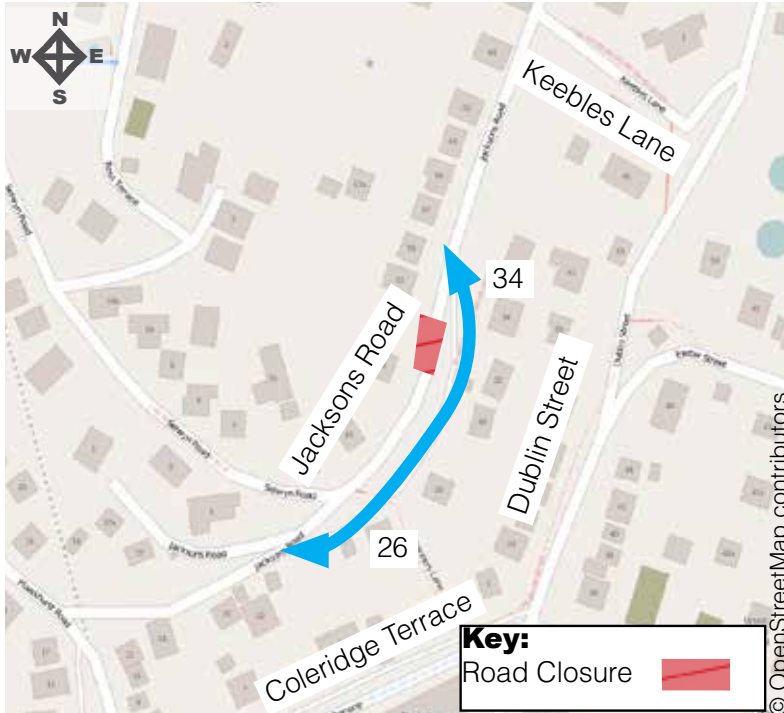

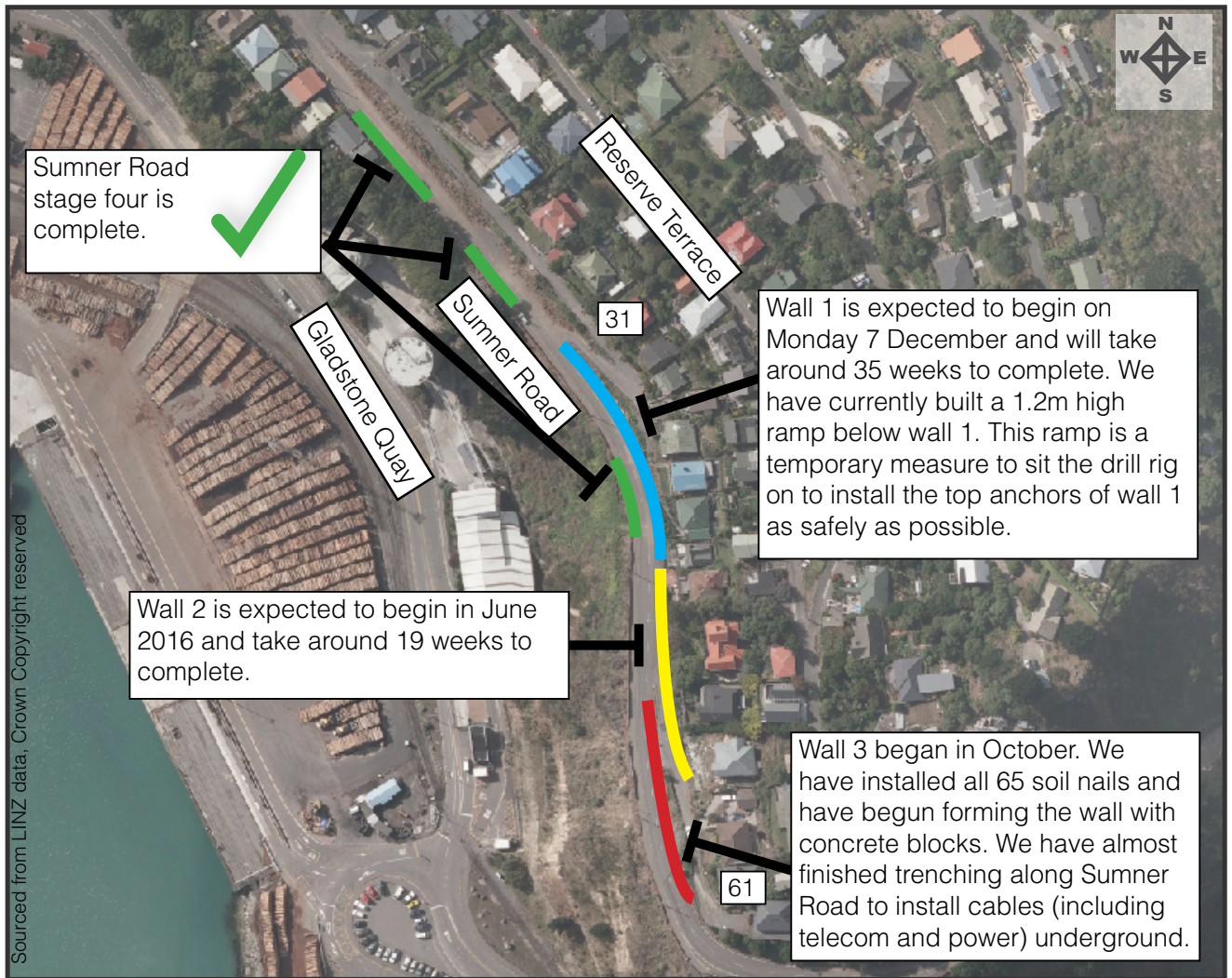

Work update: Sumner Road stage three, Lyttelton, retaining wall repairs

There are three separate retaining walls included in stage three of the Sumner Road retaining wall repairs.

Where



Sumner Road stage four is complete. ✓

Wall 1 is expected to begin on Monday 7 December and will take around 35 weeks to complete. We have currently built a 1.2m high ramp below wall 1. This ramp is a temporary measure to sit the drill rig on to install the top anchors of wall 1 as safely as possible.

Wall 2 is expected to begin in June 2016 and take around 19 weeks to complete.

Wall 3 began in October. We have installed all 65 soil nails and have begun forming the wall with concrete blocks. We have almost finished trenching along Sumner Road to install cables (including telecom and power) underground.

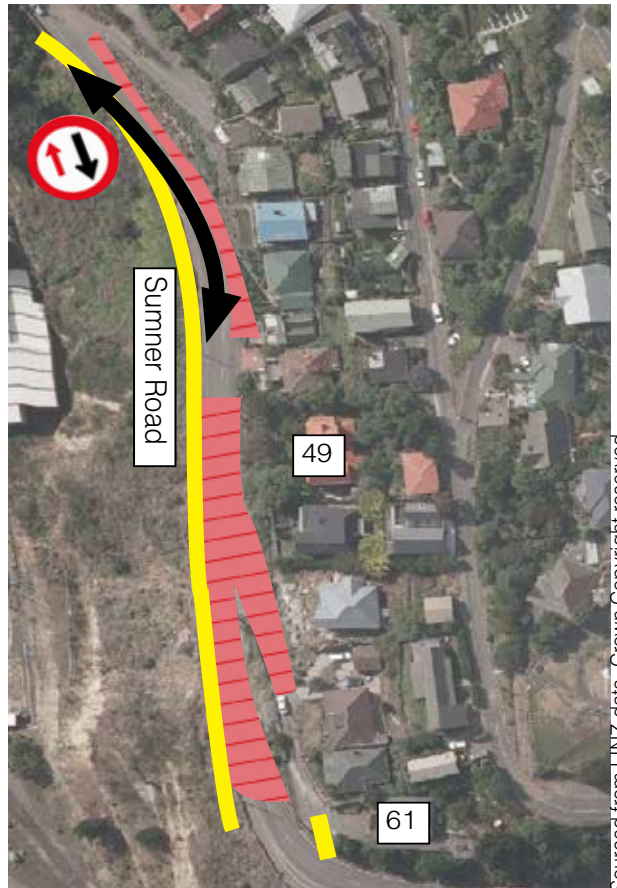
