I then drove to Foster Terrace where I was to meet up with the Lyttelton Arms/Fat Tony's planting crew for a two hour session of tree clearing which is now called releasing. Ten of us took the walk up the track into

Urumau to where a year ago the same crew planted about 50 little native shrubs.

Quite a steep bank down from the track we could see how much growth had occurred in the year. Our plants were struggling to reach the light through all the long grass. Under instruction from Brian Downey from the Reserves we were shown how to release the plants and give them the breathing space they so much needed.

Brian's knowledge with his years of planting amazed me. He knows all the botanical names for all the trees. I learnt there are so many varieties of natives. I never knew there were so many nightshades and flaxes.Many more wee trees, all individuals and all so different. A lot of grass was pulled out and used as mulch wrapped around the tree but making sure the sun and light was sure to get in.

I think we all felt a feeling of satisfaction with each clearing. Laughter and fun was had as we enjoyed nature and I noticed so much concentration put into the job by everyone.

As I stood on the track looking out across the township and hills I realised why I love Lyttelton.

All the earlier trees that were planted had grown into such lovely specimens. They had color and shapes.

Bellbirds, tui, fantails, wood pigeons were a few of the birds I saw among the bush, enjoying the freedom of their territory.

I congratulate those who have worked so hard to make this place very special. I felt it a peaceful and happy place to be.



Ōtamahua Quail Island Trust A Glimpse of Achievements

At the recent AGM of the Lyttelton Harbour Business Association the guest speaker was lan McLennan, Chair of The Ōtamahua Quail Island Ecological Restoration Trust. Ian presented a great update on the ecological work of the Trust.

Did you know that the Trust has been operating for 20 years? Whilst the Island is part of the DOC estate it's managed by the Trust. Trustees are local people and they work in partnership with Te Hapu o Ngāti Wheke.

"The concept for the original restoration came from a report by ecologist Dr Colin Meurk and the present restoration project came from a 1997 University Master Thesis by Ray Genet" he said. Over those 20 years the Trust has been working away to complete the aims of the thesis. "In terms of the planting project we are almost completed. 24 of the 85 hectares on the Island have now been planted with natives. The planting has been concentrated in the areas that are



more sheltered and have the ability to hold water."

At Quail Island there is a water supply but it's very limited so the plantings rely on rain for their survival. For that reason in the early years lan explained that kanuka (Kunzea ericoides) and pittosporums were the main trees planted. They were deemed to be very hardy and once established would provide cover and better ground conditions for other plants.

"The philosophy for the planting was based on what forest was like in other areas of the Peninsula, in particular the North West Bays were used as a guide. Plants were sourced locally from the DOC nursery in Motukarara".

Those early trees must be doing their job. There are many more plant species on the Island now. That includes Ōtamahua Quail Island Kawa kawa! If you take a close look at the Trust logo you can see the Kawakawa leaf. Unbeknowns to most, the Island was also formerly known as Te-Kawa-kawa after this peppery plant macropiper excelsum that was significant in Maori medicine. To survive this plant thrives in moist shady places so the tree cover was essential for this to grow on the Island.

"After twenty years the planting plan for the Island is almost completed," he said. The success of the programme can be seen by the birdlife. "Birds have been one of our key indicators for success. In 2012 Bellbird's and Kereru were back on the Island. In 2016 the Shining Cuckoo returned".

Similarly Ian highlighted pest eradication work has been very successful over the years. "The island has no cats, stoats, hedgehogs,rats or rabbits. The only remaining pest is mice".

One disappointment he noted has been the decline in the white flippered penguins that nest on the Island. "In 2001 we had 10 burrows on the Island and that peaked in 2007 to 41. Last count there were 4 nesting pairs!" he said. Speculation for the decline ranges from earthquake damage to the cliffs and warmer sea temperatures.

Ecological work on the island now primarily focuses on weed eradication, introduction of invertebrates and maintaining the existing forest. The trust has two part time employees and an administrator to keep the work progressing.

lan dreams that the Department of Conservation will eventually use the Island to reintroduce other bird species just like in Motutapu Island in the Hauraki Gulf where the tieke has been introduced.

If you missed Ian's informative update about the Island and you are keen to see and hear about the Island's work first hand Ian is a volunteer guide as part of the Banks Peninsula Walking Festival and he will be running a special tour on the Island Saturday November 3rd

. On that day the Minister for Conservation opens and celebrates the new family friendly tramping hut on Quail Island.

Have you heard of the CWEA? A Chat with new Coordinator Lottie Vinson

Lottie Vinson is the new CWEA Co-ordinator. CWEA stands for Canterbury Workers Educational Association. The CWEA was established in Christchurch over 100 years ago in 1915. The Association aims to provide ongoing lifelong education for adults. Lottie and her family have lived in Lyttelton for some time. She was one of the founders of Lyttelton's well-loved Garage Sale and she's been involved in many community driven projects since. The Lyttelton Review caught up with her recently to find out a little

more about her role and the possibilities for learning for Harbour residents.

Why is Life Long Learning important to you?

Well I guess I've never really seen learning as something you do when you're at school and then stop, rather that it's a product of being alive! For me learning is a process of discovering new things which is just exciting. More importantly though affordable, accessible education is essential for building a more equal society... everybody should be able to learn whatever they want, whenever they want!

What do you hope to bring to the WEA?

A little bit of Lyttelton perhaps?! Lyttelton is a pretty amazing place with an incredibly diverse community - (we don't always see eye to eye but we sure do get a lot done!) I've learnt so much from all the people I have worked with over the years so I'll definitely be drawing on all of that.

The WEA is wonderful long standing organisation but it isn't very well known, so in the short term I'm trying to change that. Ultimately though I would like to help them to really explore, develop and articulate their purpose and then find new and innovative ways to fulfill it!

What educational material does the WEA like to focus on or is it open to anything?

With everything from Middle Eastern Dance to the Philosophy of Ethics on offer I would say that the WEA is definitely open to anything! However, there is a strong commitment to subjects that promote social justice, encourage progressive thought and debate and challenge the status quo... I reckon I will feel quite at home ;-)



Is online learning available?

Yes and no! The WEA is about getting together for face to face learning and I can't see that changing anytime soon. However we do work in conjunction with Plains FM (96.9) who turn many of our talks and lectures into Podcasts. Anyone can hop onto their website (http://www.plainsfm.org.nz) and listen to them at their leisure.

Do many people from Lyttelton Harbour participate in WEA courses?

In truth I have been pleasantly surprised at how many friendly Lyttelton faces I have seen! And I feel like I might be twisting the arms of a few people already so there may be a few more from now on! In fact this coming term we have Juliet Adams from the LIFT Library tutoring a course called "Inspiring People, Innovative Solutions", local Sarah Van der Burch delivering one of our "Armchair travel" talks and Camia Young from the Collett's Corner project coming along to talk about her work as part of the "Soap Box" series.

What ideas do you have to bring WEA to Lyttelton Harbour?

Well, I'm actually in discussion with a local historian about doing a Lyttelton Harbour Tour early next year so watch this space!

Also, one idea that we are exploring is to offer a selection of our courses in satellite locations around the city... wouldn't it be great to bring the WEA to Lyttelton?! It's early days though.

Composting Tips

Compost is the single most important supplement you can give your garden. It's a simple way to add nutrient-rich humus to your lawn or garden that fuels plant growth and restores vitality to depleted soil. It's also free, easy to make, and good for the environment. But composting also has other benefits

Compost

- Start your compost pile on bare earth. This allows worms and other beneficial organisms to aerate the compost and be transported to your garden beds.
- Lay twigs or straw first, a few inches deep. This aids drainage and helps aerate the pile.
- Add compost materials in layers, alternating moist and dry. Moist ingredients are food scraps, tea bags, seaweed, etc. Dry materials are straw, leaves, sawdust pellets and wood ashes. If you have wood ashes, sprinkle in thin layers, or they will clump together and be slow to break down.
- Add manure, green manure (clover, buckwheat, wheatgrass, grass clippings) or any nitrogen source. This activates the compost pile and speeds the process along.
- **Keep compost moist.** Water occasionally, or let rain do the job.
- **Cover** with anything you have wood, plastic sheeting, carpet scraps. Covering helps retain moisture and heat, two essentials for compost.



Covering also prevents the compost from being overwatered by rain. The compost should be moist, but not soaked and sodden. the extraordinary struggles of ordinary citizens in NZ Saturday 20th October 3.30-5pm

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• **Turn.** Every few weeks give the pile a quick turn with a pitchfork or shovel. This aerates the pile. Oxygen is required for the process to work, and turning "adds" oxygen. You can skip this step if you have a ready supply of coarse material like straw. Once you've established your compost pile, add new materials by mixing them in, rather than by adding them in layers. Mixing, or turning, the compost pile is key to aerating the composting materials and speeding the process to completion. If you want to buy a compost rather than build your own compost pile, you may consider a buying a rotating compost tumbler which makes it easy to mix the compost regularly.

Why We Should Compost?

Approximately half of what NZ households send to landfill is compostable material. 10% is from the garden and whopping 40% is from the kitchen.

And what a waste it is!

When your food scraps are mixed with other rubbish in the landfill we lose all that valuable nutrient forever.

But it gets worse.

Once buried it doesn't compost down. Compost needs air and there is no air in landfill. Instead it rots down anaerobically causing problems that then have to be managed.

Liquid from the rotting waste slowly filters through the landfill, washing out all the nasties. To stop that contaminated leachate from polluting our waterways, it has to be collected and treated onsite. The other big problem is that when organic waste rots down anaerobically it gives off Methane gas (CH4). Methane is a significant Greenhouse gas, being 25 times more potent at trapping heat in the atmosphere than Carbon Dioxide (CO2).Modern landfills do capture some of that methane but not all of it.

Hot Topics

Museum- Naval Point- Rec Centre- Seafarers Centre

At the recent AGM of the Lyttelton Community Association a series of speakers were invited.

Lyttelton Museum

Peter Rough and Liz Grant from the Lyttelton Museum focused on the exciting concept plans for the new Lyttelton Museum. Liz Grant explained there hasn't been a formal launch of the concept plans yet purely because the plans aren't fully developed. She hoped the more detailed plans would be available in a month for a big announcement and celebration.

For the museum team a new museum is all about turning disaster to opportunity. "We are not just going to be a house of stories. The new site will be a hub for community and events and a place to enhance the economy of the Banks Peninsula" said Liz. The new building is being designed to reflect the port, be sympathetic to the environment and be bold. The current design could be Lyttelton's modern day equivalent of the Harbour Light. It's a very distinctive large scale building made of striking materials. A rusty steel façade is the bulk of the building peppered with various features that break up the façade such as inserts and veranda's. Small windows are designed to be portholes to historic sites of significance in Lyttelton. It's hoped there will be one retail tenant and a possibility that the Information Centre will be relocated within.

Once the preliminary design is finalised the building will be costed and then the full fundraising campaign can begin. At this stage the team estimates the build cost to be 7 million without the fit out!

Naval Point

Deputy Mayor Andrew Turner announced that the Community Board had secured 10.5 million from the Long Term Plan for badly needed upgrading work of Naval Point. "Funding will be used to remove the old marina, improve boat safety, parking, stability issues and general site tidiness". To improve all the issues for the area he said it was a 24 million dollar longer term project. This would extend to cover traffic issues, site issues, pedestrian and cycle movements, freedom camping etc. "In the near future the council will have a public consultation on all aspects of the project so that council can get a clear view of what the public prioritises for the area" he said. He indicated that the controversial topic of freedom camping would be better policed this summer with the council having more access to funding for enforcement.

Recreation Centre

This was the hottest topic for the evening. It was clear there was confusion all around. "The Recreation Centre was refurbished after the earthquakes but since its re-opening there hadn't been a clear plan for the final operation of the centre", Andrew said. This had resulted in an underutilised community facility. According to Councillor Turner, CCC staff had been delegated by the Community Board to improve the situation. Resilience Funding was used by CCC staff who contracted Project Lyttelton, whom they believed to be the most capable organisation in Lyttelton to undertake the task to activate the centre and to explore how it could be operated moving forward. "Unfortunately there were no clear roles and responsibilities between Project Lyttelton and the Council," Andrew said. "Questions like should the Recreation Centre run at a profit and what the Level of Service for a bottom line were unknowns", he said.

There were concerns from the floor that a public facility might be used for private profit and that the consultation undertaken never made mention of the withdrawal of services. Concerns were also raised about the suitability of Project Lyttelton to do this work.

An attendee wondered how the centre used to be operated? Councillor Turner detailed that the CCC used to fund a person to look after the centre. Councillor Turner said "1 would not be averse to reinstating a budget for a CCC staff member to run the centre alternatively if it could be run by the community for the community that is also a favourable option". Moving forward Councillor Turner said even though staff had the delegation for the centre operation they would not make any decisions not supported by the Community Board. Meanwhile the squash courts that have been very controversial will remain open and more information will be obtained and greater clarity will be sought around what actually needs to be achieved for the operation of the building.

Seafarers Centre

Community Board member John McLister highlighted that at a recently well attended meeting for the Seafarers Centre our local community expressed concern at the lack of facilities for seamen when they visit this port. The current temporary Seafarers centre can only provide a very limited service to visiting seamen, 7-10pm Monday to Friday and is only permitted on the current site until 2021. John is lobbying for long term security for seamen. NZ is a signatory to the Seafarers Maritime Labor Convention but there is no funding to support this goal. As an immediate action John would like to see the Lyttelton Port Company implement a levy on all visiting ships to provide the services that seamen require. If money can be sourced a permanent home for seafarers could be found and the existing temporary service could have expanded operational hours.

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Roading Working Party for Banks Peninsula – can you help?

Banks Peninsula has a network of unsealed roads built in the late 1880s during the days of the District Roads Boards. The roads are narrow and winding and have not been designed to cope with the increased use by heavier vehicles.

The Community Board is concerned that the roads appear to be deteriorating and know that general maintenance must be increased and standards raised. While there are funding constraints, there is a desire to look at ways of getting the most from the available funding.

A working group is being formed to provide advice to our Council engineers on prioritising spending. The Board is looking for three community members to join the group. We are seeking residents who have a good knowledge of Banks Peninsula's unsealed roads and can bring a local perspective. We need a geographic spread of members.

The meetings are likely to be held in Little River, probably during the day or late afternoon but this will be decided by the working party.

Warmer, healthier homes a step closer

Canterbury homeowners can now get a \$6000 rates advance to pay for home heating, insulation and ventilation improvements. Environment Canterbury started accepting applications to Healthier Homes Canterbury, announced as part of the Long-Term Plan 2018-28.

Eligible ratepayers can apply for an advance of up to \$6000 for heating, insulation and ventilation improvements and pay it back through their rates bills over nine years with interest. The interest rate for those joining before July 2019 is fixed at 5.9% per annum.

Pest monitoring can be done to identify the types of pests that are present and to get a measure of pest activity.

A tracking tunnel is a run-through tunnel containing a pad that shows the footprints of animals that travel through the tunnel. Check out the PFPH tab at www. summitroadsociety.org.nz for info on how to identify paw prints from different predators and for links to instructions on how to build your own monitoring tunnels. Or you can look for scats:

Catching pests but not sure what to do with them? If you want to dispose of them, the best solution is to dig a hole and bury them in your backyard. The Council



aren't keen on dead a n i m a l s being put in bins, but if you must, put them in the red bin, not the green one.

Alternatively, you can freeze them. Mice that are free of poisons can be collected until you have a full container for Canterbury Raptor Rescue.

If you want to learn more about trapping, how about joining a local Facebook trapping Group where you can read about what other trappers are doing, and ask any questions you might have. Tui Spreading Out - Please Record Your Sightings

Tui were once extinct on Banks Peninsula. They were reintroduced in 2009, when 72 birds were released at Hinewai Reserve.

They have since been slowly spreading out, with regular sightings in Akaroa, with sightings in Little River and other bays in Banks Peninsula. They were recently sighted in Lyttelton for the first time in 40 years. Monitoring of the Tui population helps ensure the continued success of the project. Sightings of Tui can be recorded using the iNaturalist website or App

A bumble bee is on its back



A bumble bee is on its back, its limbs are barely moving. I barely give it any thought and go inside to escape the cold.

And times over the day and night I pass it there still struggling to maintain its tenuous link with life in the grey winter misery.

A sunny nor-west morning greets me and there it is on its feet and panting. I recall bee keepers feed their hives with sugar in the winter season.

I prepare a syrup and drop it right in front of its poor little head and immediately reacts extending its proboscis to the puddle and feeds. When I come back the bee has gone. My heart is lifted by all this as if the hope of all life rested on random acts of kindness.

But was I kind or was I cruel to leave it hungry for so long? I anticipated not the warmth that sparked the thought to help it.

My problem of being a sceptic marinated in post-Christian culture is to over hope for a future where all will be healed and made whole.

The old stone gods and temples are humiliated along with the meek. Fortune sometimes favours the brave but mostly those with fortunes.

Amidst the decaying monuments of our certainties we navigate by the light of our phones tumbled on the rapids of our struggles that cannot be resolved by apps or links. I look again to the brute book of nature, the bee that just instructed me and up above feathered dinosaur asteroid survivors that are free while most of us are not.

Black backed gulls ascending in the thermals then diving and swaying in huge arcs above the light house as clouds are passing over Quail Island and beyond.

Non-fiction by John Riminton.

The European winter of 1944/5 was harsh, Icy N.E winds blew down from Eurasia bringing freezing conditions, even two rare blizzards to the German-occupied Channel Islands; boys riding heavily to school on bicycles with hose-pipe tyres faced the risk of having their red ears finger-flicked on arrival if they failed to notice the bully-boy behind them.

This 16 year old boy lived with his widowed mother in quite a large house a couple of miles west of St. Helier, Jersey. Until D-Day precious supplies had continued to come in from France including some that had enabled the Island authorities (the States) to maintain gas for cooking. However, as the Allies occupied the neighbouring Contentin Peninsula all supplies from France had stopped. In an "Unposted Letter dated Jan.1945", subsequently included in a book, "Jersey in Jail", the author, Horace Wyatt, wrote: "The last few months of 1944.....have been a period of gathering gloom. To begin with the weather broke up early and it rained more or less every day for three months. Since early September most of us have been hungry, increasingly cold, generally wet and never clean.... The gas mains were emptied as long ago as September. The water mains function for only two or three hour a day. The supply of current from the electric power stations has just ceased and the telephone service is to stop in a few day's time......There is no longer any ration of wood fuel. The steam laundries are closed down and hand laundries cannot work for want of soap and fuel. Personal cleanliness is out of the guestion".

In the boy's home his mother had brought all activity into one room, previously known as the Morning Room. Now it held both their beds and such cooking as was possible, depending on the availability of black market wood, was done on a trivet fixed to the grate of the small open fire. Fortunately the house had quite a large garden that was now dedicated to growing the staples of potatoes, onions, haricot beans and brassicas. Such wood as was publicly available was all taken by the States and allocated to district bake-houses to which households could take a dish of vegetables in the morning. There they would share the oven with many other dishes to be collected some 3-4 hours later. The problem was then to get it home while it still retained some warmth.

Our Spring dawned early in 1945 at a time when the weekly rations were:

Flour: 7 oz;(198gms) Butter: nil; Suger: Nil; Salt: nil; Meat: (adults and juveniles): 20z; (56gms) Children: 1 oz.

The relief came in the form of Red Cross parcels, issued at about six weekly intervals to every civilian. Our summer, of course, came in May that year when we were liberated and the war ended.

Post-D-Day the German garrison, some 16,000 troops consisting now mainly of old men, broken men (back from the Russian front) and boys my age, was also cut off from all support and, as combatants, not eligible for the Red Cross parcels. Shabby, starving, disillusioned, knowing that Hitler had let them down, they could only look forward to detention camps and eventual return to their bomb-ravaged homeland.

There is no doubt that some winters are worse than others.


