SHARE YOUR VIEWS ON CHRISTCHURCH'S FORMER GODLEY HOUSE SITE

People are being urged to put forward ideas for the best future use of the reserve that was the former Godley House site in Diamond Harbour.

Built in 1880, the former home of leading Canterbury artist Margaret Stoddart was severely damaged in the 2010-2011 earthquakes. It was demolished in 2012.

The Stoddart family had bought Godley House from a Lyttelton merchant, Harvey Hawkins, in the mid-1890s. It was sold in 1913 and later used as a hotel, restaurant and conference centre.

Future options are being sought for a landmark Diamond Harbour site.

The Christchurch City Council now wants public feedback to help inform a decision on the use of the empty site, including whether any change to the area's recreation classification is required to better meet community needs.

Consultation is now open, with the local community invited to attend a drop-in session on Saturday, 20 July at the Diamond Harbour Community Centre from 1pm to 3pm.

Council Parks Planning and Asset Management Manager Kelly Hansen says the Council wants to know the local community's views.

"It is a landmark site in Diamond Harbour, and an area with considerable historical and cultural values in the development of Banks Peninsula," Ms Hansen says.

"Several major Stoddart works also feature the house and gardens.

"We hope that residents can take the time to drop in to the upcoming public session at the local community centre and share their ideas, or make a submission online."

Banks Peninsula Community Board Chairperson Pam Richardson has welcomed the move to make the most of the site.

"We hope that everyone makes their voices – and opinions – heard," Mrs Richardson says.

"It's important that the local community plays a strong role in the final recommendation."

Consultation closes on Monday, 5 August, with a report going to the Banks Peninsula Community Board on Monday, 2 September.

A QUIET ACHIEVER ANNA SMITH HONORED

Anna received a lovely surprise this year. She was nominated and accepted a St John honour. St John is the only organisation in New Zealand outside of Government with its own Royal honours system. Admission is based on nomination The honour awarded to Anna was a M.St.J. (Member of the Order of St John). She was awarded this for all the years of exceptional service she has given to St John in the Banks Peninsula area. The majority of her work has been as a volunteer.

Anna Smith is one of the faces behind St John Banks Peninsula. As well as a full time teaching career she's added St John as her volunteer contribution to community life. Lyttelton was the catalyst for her involvement. "A little over ten years ago I was based at Lyttelton Primary School. At that time there was a playground incident — not life threatening — at the school that required an ambulance and I discovered there was no local on the ground St John help."

Anna is very humbled that she has been given this honour. She hopes it might inspire others to get involved with the local St John. "The reason I got involved with St John was to contribute something locally to Lyttelton, the community where I worked."

For herself this meant upskilling. She completed St John training courses and gained a First Responder qualification and later a Diploma in Ambulance Practice. Over the years Anna has held various roles in St John.

"I've been at the front line volunteering on the ambulance, taught first aid courses, fundraised for defibrillators at key locations around our bays and to this day I'm still involved at a governance level serving on the Banks Peninsula area committee."

Thanks to Anna, St John Lyttelton is the only member of Timebanking NZ wide! Through the Timebank the community has gained access to first aid training courses for the swimming pool and local emergency management teams. The ambulance rooms in Lyttelton were also made available for time credits when community buildings were so scarce after the earthquakes. Local St John volunteers qualify for time credits.

The thing Anna likes most about what she does is the people.

"It's such a privilege to be able to be of service and assist people when they are in need, whether it be in their homes or out in the community."

NAVAL POINT

Take a Closer Look – Haul Out Yard – Camper Vans – Rowing Club – Sea Scouts

Many of you will have received the proposed Naval Point project outlines in your mail box or have heard about drop-in sessions for information.

At a public meeting recently the CCC project team went through the two options that the Christchurch City Council is proposing. Both options include an upgrade to the Rec Ground, improved boating safety, an improved breakwater, nicer amenity features and a more accessible area. Differences between the options relate to the amount of car parking proposed 270 vs 400 places, the size of the break water, the amount of public space available, how the site is accessed on foot or cycle and how large the site is.

Community conversations at the public meeting and at the Community Board meeting also highlighted more things to think about. Lyttelton resident Mark Cox took the time to attend the public meeting and also visit the Community Board. Mark echoes what many people have thought for such a long time. "It's time the area got some love".

Mark was also able to bring a local boat users community perspective to the table. Having lived in the Harbour his entire life he fondly reflects on how important a haul out yard is for the DIY boaties in the area. "Neither proposal has a haul out option", he says.

Pam Richardson the Chair of the Community Board wanted to know what was required for the boat community to work on their boats. In Mark's opinion you need a space for around 15-20 boats to be worked on. Currently this is not provided for in either plan. Staff at the public meeting had made the assumption that a haul out yard would be

a commercial opportunity for someone on private land elsewhere. Mark's concern was once that happens the facility becomes unaffordable for many.

He felt there was a lot at stake for the local community if this facility is not provided on council owned land.. "The DIY lifestyle of the mum and dad small boat owner will die off".

Another interesting issue raised at both meetings was the former Rowing Club building. Now sitting idle on LPC land, this historic building appears to have no home. Could the historic rowing building be utilised on the site? At the same time it was also highlighted that the scout den is included in one option and not the other. Sea Scouts are popular in Lyttelton and there is an active group. Where can they go?

Other issues that were highlighted include:

- Access to the site. There is only one way in by a rather bad road.
- Walking and cycling has been considered in the plans with one option using the roading network and the other the disused rail line.
- Camper van "pay" facilities do not appear to have been considered. In Wellington campers have a designated pay area on the foreshore where they have toilets/showers. It was noted that site security might benefit if campers were encouraged to be on the site.
- There is a very strong reliance on motor vehicles for access with hundreds of car parks incorporated into both plans.

If any of these issues or others are important to you, now is the time to tell your elected representatives your views. There is just over \$10 million dollars budgeted for the project. Help the council create the best possible water sports and recreational facilities for this area.





STEPPING DOWN FROM BOARD ROLES AFTER 16 YEARS!

Humble and hardworking and a much loved mentor and colleague, long term Project Lyttelton Board member, treasurer and project leader Wendy Everingham is stepping down from her Board roles after 16 years. The vast majority of Wendy's work has been as an unpaid volunteer and her contribution has been outstanding. Anneleise Hall had a chat to her about her time with PL.

"It's hard to believe it's that long really", says Wendy Everingham as she steps down from Project Lyttelton's board and her Treasurer role.

"In some ways it doesn't seem that long ago since John and I came over from Melbourne, and were brand new to Lyttelton.

"Then I was going to meetings with Margaret (Jefferies) talking about what Lyttelton wanted to be." Margaret had taken over as chair, from what was then Project Port Lyttelton, after previous chair John Cleaver retired.

Coming from a background focusing on transport, being part of Project Lyttelton and working with Margaret gave Wendy a wider vision of what was possible.

One of the first things she was involved with was to create a mind map during an early brainstorm, a vision for what was possible.

"It's pretty amazing that after 10 years we ticked everything off on that list that we both dreamt about in 2003. It was really nice to be working with someone who was thinking so far outside the square and challenging me to do the same."

She is proud of the projects that have been set up during her time at PL, and over the years she has had input into every project.

"Being in Project Lyttelton really does make you think about sustainability and what that means, how we can make changes to get other people thinking about that," Wendy said.

"Getting people to think about what they buy, where they shop how they live, how they get to places. It's been a great way for experimenting," she says.

"The time bank was, and still is, such an amazing community building tool, the Farmers Market for local food, the Community Garden teaching people how to grow their own produce, everything's about connecting and learning. The Garage Sale is amazing for recycling, getting people to think that if they are going to throw something out let someone else use it."

When asked about her favourite project Wendy reveals she still has a soft spot for her first ever project, the Snakes and Ladders walking map.

"We launched it on the corner of London and Oxford Street, there was probably about 50 people.



Lachie Griffin was there with his goat and Neil Struthers with the bagpipes, and everyone was piped up to the Timeball Station."

"That was pretty special."That opportunity also introduced Wendy to key people who would come on board with future projects.

The Farmers market was also a high point. It began with a team of volunteers.

"At that stage there were no markets in Lyttelton and there were no community spaces to meet up."

Wendy was also heavily involved in all the festivals and enjoyed connecting with a wide range of people and businesses over the years.

"When we all work together amazing things happen."

Wendy plans take a much deserved break to see what comes along next.

Meanwhile she is optimistic PL will thrive without her.

"There comes a time when you have to pass the baton, and if you're there you get deferred to. I want these great people to fly just like I've flown. You have to make spaces and there's always someone to fill that space. You have to let people feel confident that they can do it too."

Wendy remains passionate about the community and the environment and has also contributed significant time to Urumau Reserve planting and governance which she will continue.

"I'm really interested in our local seed collection of remnant forest, making that happen on a larger scale."

"I don't want to jump into anything straight away."

"I'm sure something will come to me, I think that's what you learn with PL, just wait and stuff comes to you, look for that energy and always think things can happen."

Walks are normally finished by 12.30 -1pm.

On the last Thursday of the month we join the community for morning tea at 10am at the local fire station social rooms and later walk it off with a short local walk.

We really look forward to our weekly friendship walk. Come and join us.

I sat on a park bench enjoying the sunshine, after a cold night spent under an Avon river bridge in Christchurch. But it was still warmer than the previous night, when frost covered my sleeping bag in Hagley Park. The wanker who recommended bedding down there, groped me in the darkness, so I kicked him in the crutch and moved on. Living on the streets isn't that easy for a girl.

I was born into a South Canterbury sheep farming family. My whole life, centred on the farm, and it was idyllic. I loved animals and becoming a vet was high on my wish list. But because I constantly obtained high grades, I attracted the bullies at school.

'Look at Gawky Gay, up herself as usual. Stuck your arm up any pregnant cows lately?' They never let up texting me. So, I talked it over with Dad, who advised ignoring it.

'If you fail to react, Gay, they will shift their attention to someone else.' Good advice that unfortunately didn't work. They stepped it up a notch or two, leaving disgusting messages about me around the whole school. I became severely depressed. Would my final school year never end? Then my beloved Dad died when his quad bike flipped over on a steep slope. Mum tried hard to go it alone but found it too difficult. Enter, Rick Hawk with his sheepdog. 'The world is over-populated so why don't you give it a break and die.' The pressure was relentless, day and night. I managed to find left-over food behind restaurants and supermarkets. Finally, late one evening, it all came to a head and I broke down and cried.

'What's the matter Love?' She was bending over me, her hand on my shoulder. I pulled myself together, wiping away my tears.

'Sorry, but I'm homeless, hungry and cold,' I told her.

'How long have you been on the streets?' Her voice sounded kind and encouraging.

'About two months,' I answered, taking a quick look at her. She wore a micro/mini skirt, high heels and plenty of makeup.

'I can get someone to help you.'

'No, it's alright, my boyfriend's just fetching us a takeaway,' I lied.

'That's good then, but I'll be around all evening, if you change your mind. I'm Gloria, by the way. My man could arrange some accommodation for you.'

'Thanks, but I'm okay, we just argued, that's all, goodbye.'
I stood up and walked away, conscious of her eyes on my back. Returning to my under-bridge pad. I sat and reviewed my situation for the thousandth time. Life sucked, the messages were right, I was a waste of space. Dark thoughts took over and six depressing hours later, I reckoned it was time to make a quiet exit into the river. I removed my clothes down to my undies, I'd heard that one dies quicker the colder you are, and stood shivering, plucking up the courage to take the final step. Then something cold and wet made contact with my rear end. I jumped, but the contact persisted. Reaching back, I found a Labrador cross, busy wagging her tail.

'Hello girl, what's your name then?' She woofed, pleased to be stroked. That moment I knew I had found a soul mate, someone with which to bond. After hurriedly dressing I sat and cuddled my new companion and she responded with thankful licks. This gorgeous creature saved me from the edge of no return, I thought.

'You're my lucky number, girl, I think I'll call you Lotto,' I said.

'Come on, Lotto, it's time to go.' I walked her across the bridge, pausing briefly to hurl my mobile phone into the river Avon.

'Sorry, environmentalists, but we're leaving our old lives behind.'
