NEW CHIEF EXECUTIVE ANNOUNCED



The Board of Lyttelton Port Company (LPC) recently announced the appointment of Roger Gray as the Port's new Chief Executive.

Roger is Group General Manager Airports at Air New Zealand. In this role he manages all ground handling and lounge operations at 55 airports around the globe, covering 2,700 staff who handle 18 million passengers annually. Prior to this, Roger

was Group General Manager Business Performance at Air New Zealand.

Roger will take over from LPC's outgoing CE Peter Davie in the new year.

Chair Margaret Devlin says Roger brings to the role significant expertise and knowledge in logistics, procurement, leadership and operations on both sides of the Tasman.

"His extensive experience running complex business units with large numbers of operational staff is a real asset, not just for the Port, but for the whole Canterbury region. We're delighted to have secured someone of his calibre. We're looking forward to Roger joining us at the end of the year."

Roger says he's eager to take on the challenge of running New Zealand's third largest Port.

"I'm honored LPC's Chair and Board have entrusted me with the role of Chief Executive. It will be tough following Peter Davie. He's had 16 very successful years at the helm, and I'm looking forward to working with the team at LPC to take the Port to the next stage," says Roger Gray.

"The Port's rebuild has really set it up to cement its place as the South Island's international trade gateway. I'm looking forward to being be a part of that story into the future.

"My wife Caroline and I are also excited to move to Christchurch from Auckland in the next few months. We know we're lucky to be joining the wonderful Canterbury community."

Before joining Air New Zealand in 2013, Roger was Managing Director - Australia for the Blue Star Print Group. He has also held several senior leadership roles with Goodman Fielder, including Managing Director of Quality Bakers - New Zealand and Supply Chain Director for Goodman Fielder Baking - Australia.

Roger has worked as a Logistician at the Sydney Organising Committee for the Olympics Games, and was also an officer in the Australian Army.

He holds an MBA, a Masters of Business in Integrated Logistics Management, as well as Bachelor Degrees in Economics and Arts.

Roger won a Prime Minister's Business Scholarship in 2017 which enabled him to complete an Advanced Management Programme at INSEAD in Fontainebleau, France in 2018.

He was a finalist for Health and Safety Leader of the Year in 2018.

KEEP A LOOK OUT FOR YOUR VOTING PAPERS

Voting papers for Christchurch's local body elections should start turning up in people's letterboxes from this Friday. Each enrolled voter in Christchurch will receive a voting form, a candidate profile booklet, and a pre-paid return envelope.

"There is a lot of choice for voters this year, with 13 candidates for Mayor and a contest for every Council seat," says Christchurch City Council Electoral Officer Jo Daly.

"At the last election in 2016 several candidates were elected unopposed to the Council and Community Boards, and less than 40 per cent of eligible Christchurch voters took part in the election.

"We want to see a higher turn-out this year and are encouraging all eligible voters to take the time to find out who is standing in their area and to cast a vote.

"You will find information about who is standing in your voting pack but the free mobile app Celect is another great way to learn about who is standing. The app lets you browse candidate profiles and shortlist your favourite candidates.

Once you have received your voting papers and decided whom you want to vote for, you should complete your voting form, put it in the return postage-paid envelope, and post it.


To make sure your vote arrives before voting closes at noon on Saturday 12 October, post it by 5pm on Tuesday 8 October.

Completed voting documents can also be delivered to the Christchurch City Council Civic Offices at 53 Hereford Street, or any open Council library or service centre, until noon on Saturday 12 October.

"If your voting papers haven't arrived by Wednesday 25 September, you'll need to get in touch with us and arrange to cast a special vote," says Ms Daly.

CHRISTCHURCH SETS 2045 CARBON NEUTRAL TARGET

Christchurch will have net zero greenhouse emissions - excluding methane - by 2045 if the city meets the target set by Christchurch City Council.

"We were among the first Councils in New Zealand to declare a Climate and Ecological Emergency and it is important that we back that declaration up by showing our strong commitment to reducing greenhouse gas emissions," says Council Head of Strategic Policy Emma Davis.

"The Government's Zero Carbon Bill sets the target of New Zealand having net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050, excluding biogenic methane, but the feedback we have received from our residents showed they want us to take a more ambitious approach.

"Today the Council has agreed that Christchurch should set itself the target of achieving net zero greenhouse gas emissions – excluding methane - by 2045.

"To ensure we stay on track to meet that target, we have set an interim target of achieving a 50 per cent reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by 2030.

"By 2030 we also want to see at least a 25 per cent reduction in methane emissions so that we can achieve at least a 50

per cent reduction in methane emissions by 2045," Ms Davis says.

In 2016/17 Christchurch emitted an estimated 2,485,335 gross tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalent (t CO2 e). That equates to 6.6 t CO2 e per person. That is lower than per capita estimates for Auckland (7.9 t CO2 e) and Dunedin (11 t CO2 e) but more than Wellington (5.7 t CO2 e).

The largest contributor to Christchurch's carbon emissions is transportation. It accounts for 53 per cent of carbon emissions.

Ms Davis says achieving the 2045 carbon neutral target is going to require the buy-in of the entire Christchurch community.

"We're all going to have to make changes; we are all going to have to play our part in reducing our emissions, but I'm confident that our communities are up for the challenge. This is an achievable target and by adopting it today we are showing that as a city we are committed to playing a strong role in combating climate change."

SOFT PLASTICS MUST GO IN RED WHEELIE BIN

About 45 tonnes of soft plastics are ending up at Christchurch's EcoSort recycling plant each month because people mistakenly believe they will be recycled. Soft plastics are any plastics that people can easily scrunch or bend in their hand, such as plastic bags, cling film, courier bags, bubble wrap, and cellophane. These soft plastics cannot be recycled because they are low grade and there is no viable local or international market for them.

Soft plastics are causing problems at the EcoSort facility because they have to be removed by hand, which is a time consuming and costly process.

"The automated machines that sort and bale the materials for recycling can't detect the soft plastics so staff at the plant have to remove them by hand or otherwise they will contaminate our recyclable material," says Christchurch City Council Solid Waste Manager Ross Trotter.

"It's a tough job because the soft plastics often get tangled with the other materials and in the machinery itself. EcoSort has had to take on extra staff to deal with the problem so that has added significantly to their operational costs, which

has to be passed onto the ratepayer," Mr Trotter says.

"We can't afford though to let any soft plastics into our recycling because if we do, the local and international markets that we currently sell all the accepted contents of your yellow wheelie bin to, will stop buying from us.

"If we lose our recycling markets, then there is a high risk the material you put in your yellow wheelie bin will end up at the landfill and we don't want to see that happen," Mr Trotter says.

"We appreciate the efforts you are taking to recycle but if you have soft plastics, then please put them in your red wheelie bin.

"Do the scrunch test if you're unsure whether the plastic you're wanting to dispose of should go in the red or the yellow wheelie bin. If you can bend or scrunch the plastic in your hand or bend it, then it should go in the red bin," Mr Trotter says.

The Council's wheelie bin app [https://ccc.govt.nz/services/rubbish-and-recycling/wheelie-bins-app] can help people work out what should go in each of your three bins.

Tips for reducing your soft plastics use

Use beeswax food wraps instead of plastic cling film or snaplock bags.

For school or work lunches, take your lunch in a reusable container rather than in a plastic bag.

At the supermarket put your fresh produce directly into your shopping trolley and then straight into a reusable shopping bag at the checkout. If you really want to bag fresh produce, use paper bags or light-weight mesh cloth bags.

Consider carefully when you buy – look for items that have little or no plastic packaging.

Consider shopping from bulk bin stores that allow you to bring your own reusable containers.

PLEASE DON'T WALK SUMNER ROAD.

We've just started a massive planting operation above Sumner Road. We're putting traffic management and temporary fencing in place to reduce the risk to people travelling the road from small rocks being potentially dislodged by the planting teams above.

We urge people not to walk Sumner Road - at any time - but particularly over the next month while this work is being done. In rock fall zones, pedestrians are at increased risk than people cycling or in vehicles due to the longer time they spend in the area.

Also, while there is no law against walking Sumner Road, there are no pedestrian facilities on the road, so people walking the road put themselves and other road users at risk, as there is limited or no space for pedestrians to safely move out of the way of cars and trucks.

There are heaps of walking tracks in the area that offer a safe alternative with equally amazing views.

IMPORTANT HEALTH INITIATIVE

Advisory from Naval Point Club Newsletter that is applicable to the wider community

Following the discovery of an introduced mosquito breed that can carry Dengue fever Community & Public Health (CPH) have recently conducted a survey around the waterfront. As part of that survey a number of potential mosquito breeding habitats have been identified and we have been asked to assist in reducing the risk of mosquito breeding by reducing the likelihood of stagnant water build-up prior to the summer mosquito breeding season.

One of the significant items identified as being a risk by CPH are the numerous old / used tyres scattered around the yard being used for supporting dinghies, waka's etc. Our risk minimisation strategy recommends drilling holes in the sidewalls of the tyres (either the underside or both sides) to enable water to drain through. We are working through this process with the tyres utilised by NPCL in the yard or haul out areas. We recommend that members who are using tyres as supports for their vessels do the same, we can assist if you would like us to.

INNOVATION AND SUSTAINABILITY FUND

SAFETY BYLAWS UPDATE FROM NAVAL POINT CLUB

Please be aware:

If you are on the water in any vessel 6m or less in length, then you must wear a lifejacket. If you are a non-powered vessel 6m or less in length or a paddle craft, or solely powered by oars: You must have the current owner's name and address somewhere on the vessel. It can be as simple as writing it with marker pen inside the hull.


COMMUNITY HOUSE — PLASTIC FREE MEALS

Lyttelton Community House (LCH) is proud of its new initiative to reduce plastic waste. LCH runs a meals service which home-delivers healthy, freshly cooked meals to residents in the Lyttelton, Bays and Heathcote areas. Since April, LCH has stopped using single use plastic meal containers and instead delivers meals in reusable glass containers with reusable lids. Glass containers were favoured over plastic containers, because as well as being microwave-, oven- and dishwasher proof, they are attractive to use.

OPPORTUNITIES ABOUND MAKING A DIFFERENCE

There's a lot going on in local Vicki Tahau Paton's life. By profession she's one of our local real estate agents. With spring on the doorstep there are many houses to sell and she's also just taken on the role of selling agent for Lyttelton's newest development, Collett's Corner. Collett's Corner fits in with her ethos of supporting people's wellbeing and building community.

"This development will be a community within a community. Apartment owners, tenants and the public will all share the space. I love that the design caters for older people and apartment living. At last there will be some different housing choices in Lyttelton. I hope this development will stem some of the tide of older residents selling up and feeling their only option is to move to the flat".

Added to her normal workload Vicki has just become the Chair of the Lyttelton Harbour Business Association. With this new role she's very keen to see the LHBA as a facilitating mentoring group for both young and old. She's only been in the role a week and her first initiative is being rolled out. The NZ Youth Mentoring Network will be coming to Lyttelton to run a workshop on October 18th. Thirty five places will be available for young people and locals who are interested in participating. Vicki hopes some students will be able to attend and the training can be included as part of their studies. The workshop aim is to train local people who work with youth and those who would like to work with youth, and give them the skills to have a quality mentoring relationship with younger people.

Vicki's mind is racing at the possibilities.

"Imagine if our young people can be offered relationships with our local businesses and get a glimpse of what future work opportunities are available for them in port. There are so many interesting businesses here ranging from social enterprises, port focused business, hospitality, IT, tourism and retail".

She's also keen for local community groups and businesses to promote themselves.

"I'd love to see an expo or series of expos where we showcase ourselves to all people from here, both young and old. For me it's all about sharing knowledge and helping one another. Years ago I started a business in Lyttelton and it failed. At that time I didn't have much support. I want to ensure local businesses know they have support and that we can work as a team and help each other when support is needed".

Another idea that flies by as we speak is developing a local business directory.

"We used to have one so this shouldn't be too hard to resurrect".

Vicki has also put her hand up to be elected onto the District Health Board. At the last election Vicki stood to be a City



Councilor in the Central Ward. She wasn't successful but during this time she got involved with city wide housing forums. Coupled with her work in real estate she knows there are major issues with social housing and health in Christchurch. She's very keen to ensure vulnerable people have healthy housing.

"I think I can have a greater impact on positive outcomes by being on the District Health Board and coming from a wellness perspective", she said.

Vicki wants social housing providers and in particular the Christchurch City Council provider to be forced to follow new legislation on having warm and healthy homes.

"Over 900 social houses do not comply with the regulations in Christchurch due to a loophole regarding the ability to insulate some older style houses" she said.

She's very conscious of a lack of support for drug and alcohol rehabilitation. "It's time places like Queen Mary Hospital were reopened again".

Vicki believes that it's easy to juggle quite a few different roles.

"It's all a matter of organizing your time and priorities well".

Her business is her number one priority and that allows her the freedom to achieve all her other community aims.

WIMBLEDON





Pip Andrews watched his son practice serving tennis balls at their Teddington property. The balls followed guideline strings he had rigged months before, most hitting the dead centre of a red painted circle. He smiled, the lad was improving fast, just his speed to work on now. Pip had played at Wimbledon in his youth but had failed to qualify. But Eddie was a much better player, already representing NZ overseas. They both wanted him to have a crack at Wimbledon. 'Now work on your speed son, I'll set the speed camera up.' Eddie was eighteen, weighed 121 kilos and was 2.33 metres tall, giving him a huge physical advantage. Later, Pip entered, 'All over, 129 mph,' he said, 'it's coming along.' 'Yeah, but still not fast enough, Dad. I need to match that Aussie, Sam Groth, who served a staggering 163 mph ace.'

The following year Eddie won a coveted wild card entry. It was now all down to him. Eddie drew Andy Murray, the British champion and a Wimbledon crowd favourite. The youngster beat him in straight sets, Eddie was on fire. The media didn't know how to react to his play. But the Wimbledon crowd did, they loved him. This teenage Kiwi giant stole their hearts, with the incredible speed of his serves. Slow-motion replays showed the accuracy of his aces. Surely, they were witnessing the arrival of a future number one?

By the end of the match bald patches had appeared where Eddie's scorching deliveries had landed. The umpires had never called for so many new balls. International media were eager to learn more. By the time Eddie made the semi-finals, Australia had already claimed him as one of their own; making Kiwis squirm, as Australia had already claimed NZ's champion racehorse, Phar Lap, as their own. 'You dropped off the speed towards the end, Eddie, how come?"I paced myself, Dad, the competition is getting tougher, Rafa Nadel was no pushover." Understood, but averaging 131 mph may not cut it with Federer, he's a machine on court.' Pip sighed, he hated pushing his son, but as coach it was his job, plus he had heard whispers about competitive moves, to combat Eddie's speed of play. The media compared him to the Australian legend, Rod Laver, four times Wimbledon champion in the sixties. Pip and Eddie discussed possible changes of play.

'Eddie, play as you've trained, don't try any new moves now, son, stick to the knitting, we know that works, okay?' Eddie nodded.'Well it has so far, I'm into the semi's, but I wonder what the competition is planning?' Eddie answered.'T've put out feelers but can't find any reliable information anywhere, said Pip."They could be just trying to unsettle me, Dad?' Pip agreed this might

Following an all-night session Wimbledon management chose the safest option, outlawing serving speeds over 120 mph. The top speed across professional men's singles tennis players being around 114 mph. Eddie was disappointed but had to accept the ruling.

The semi's match resumed, once the slow clapping had stopped. Federer had first service and delivered an ace. The crowd groaned, with many encouraging Eddie with colonial accents. The atmosphere was electric, the crowd waited for the new star to shine. Media commentators were almost too nervous to speak, for fear of saying the wrong thing on this epic occasion. Federer's second serve slammed into the opposite corner that Eddie could not reach. The twenty times grand slam champion, then gave the young New Zealander a tennis tutorial. He made his muscular opponent run all over the court. Eddie, despite his amazing physique, could not cope and his game fell apart.

The crowd watched in dismay, as their young hero was torn apart, many shedding tears. Federer retained his usual remote calmness and did what was necessary. The match ended with Eddie on his knees, head down, utterly spent and shattered, his Wimbledon dream over. Federer dropped his racket and jumped the net to reach Eddie. Dropping down alongside the Kiwi he embraced him and whispered compassionate words of encouragement. Wimbledon had never witnessed such an emotional act of kindness. The two players gathered their belongings together and supreme champion, Rodger Federer, insisted that Eddie lead the way off-court, ignoring the traditional winner goes first, and the surprised looks of the court officials.



- 1. Youth mentoring recognises culture
 - What are the unique indigenous approaches to mentoring in Aotearoa?

 - How can we refocus and get relationships back on track?
- 6. Youth mentoring needs continuity
 - What skills and qualities can we apply as relationships mature?
 - How do mentoring relationships develop long term?
 - What kinds of ritual and rhythms can we create?
- 7. Youth mentoring enables change
 - What impact are our relationships actually having?
 - How can we evaluate progress and the covenant?
 - How do we know we've made a difference?


