Proposal for flexible wheelie bin system unveiled

Christchurch City Council is seeking the public's views on a flexible wheelie bin system that would allow people who choose to down-size their bins to pay less.

"We want to respond to residents' calls for more choice in the size of the bins that they have so we are proposing to introduce a flexible bin system where you only pay for what you use," says Council Head of Three Waters and Waste Helen Beaumont.

"Currently each household gets a standard size of bins which they pay for through their rates. Under the new system we are proposing, people will be able to choose the size of their red, green and yellow wheelie bin.

"If they choose to go small, they will pay less. For example, if they choose to downsize all three wheelie bins to 80 litres, they'll save about \$50 a year. If they choose to only downsize their red bin, they'll save about \$35," Ms Beaumont says.

The lower charge for smaller sized bins reflects the fact that they hold less material.

"It costs us more to dispose of rubbish than to process recycling or organics," Ms Beaumont explains. "While we recover some costs for recycling and organics we still pay to process them – nothing is free. This is why if you choose a smaller bin it will cost you less and a bigger bin will cost you more."

Under the proposal people who opt for a bigger red bin – a 240 litre capacity bin – will get charged an extra \$105 a year, on top of the standard kerbside bin charge.

"People have told us they want an option of a big red bin but it will cost more because there is more material to take to landfill," Ms Beaumont says.

"Offering a larger red option will provide more rubbish capacity for large households. It may also help to reduce recycling contamination by providing more space for rubbish so it doesn't get put into the yellow bin. Our neighbouring Councils - Selwyn and Waimakariri - offer

residents the option of a large red bin and we want to offer the same service to our residents."

Christchurch City Council already offers residents the opportunity to get a large organics bin through its contractor – at a cost of an extra \$196 a year.

Under the proposed flexible bin system, the cost of upgrading to a large green bin would only be an extra \$85 a year.

"Offering a large organics bin helps prevent excess green waste going into the red bin," Ms Beaumont says. "The more organics that goes into the green bin, the more we can compost, preventing it going to landfill – saving money and the environment."

As part of the proposal to move to a flexible bin system, the Council is also looking at making some billing changes to make the costs of the kerbside collection clearer.

"You already pay for your kerbside bins in your rates now. Currently your charges are split into two different rating types so it's not clear how much you pay for your kerbside service.

"To make the costs clearer, we are proposing that the existing targeted rate will cover all kerbside collection and processing costs," Ms Beaumont says.

"We want to know what people think about the changes we are proposing. It's a chance for us to engage early with our communities and get some initial feedback on what we're proposing. More information on the proposal will be communicated when we prepare the 2022/23 Annual Plan next year."

Start of summer heralds new freedom camping rules

People freedom camping in Christchurch and Banks Peninsula will face a few new restrictions this summer.

Christchurch City Council has adopted an updated, replacement Freedom Camping Bylaw that will come into force on 1 December 2021. It includes provision for:

- A new City Coastal Restricted Zone where self-contained freedom campers can stay up for four nights in any 30-day period, with no more than two nights in any one place. This will address the issue of people camping in the area for long periods of time by using the 500-metre re-set rule in the old bylaw.
- A ban on freedom camping in Southshore and in the hillside residential area in Takamatua.
- A permanent ban on freedom camping in the North Beach Carpark on the weekends from October through to May. Previously the ban has been temporary.
- A new rule to prevent campers from blocking thoroughfares, particularly in busy carparks, where other users need access, and it could be a safety issue.
- A change to where freedom campers can stay at Naval Point. A new specified area will allow up to 18 self-contained vehicles.

"The 2015 Freedom Camping Bylaw generally worked well but there were some areas where freedom camping was creating concerns for communities," says Deputy Mayor and Banks Peninsula Councillor Andrew Turner.

"The new provisions in the 2021 Freedom Camping Bylaw are a response to those concerns and should help to protect local communities from the adverse impacts of freedom camping, whilst still allowing opportunities for responsible campers to visit our beautiful district," Cr Turner says.

The Council consulted the public about its proposals to update the Freedom Camping Bylaw earlier this year. It received 97 submissions, all of which were considered by a Hearings Panel, chaired by Cr Turner, in September.

As a result of the feedback received in the submissions, the Hearings Panel decided to recommend to Council that it:

- Extend the City Coastal Restricted Zone to the north to include Broadpark Road, Larnach Street, part of Ashton Drive and Sandholm Close.
- Prohibit freedom camping in Southshore, from Caspian Street south. The original proposal was to include this area in the City Coastal Restricted Zone.
- Prohibit freedom camping in the hillside residential area in Takamatua. Residents raised concerns during the submission process that the roads in this area were narrow, windy and steep and unsuitable

for large camping vehicles, and provided few appropriate locations for freedom camping.

The Panel's recommendations were all accepted by the Council.

"We want freedom campers to visit and enjoy their time in our district, but we do need to balance the interests of freedom campers with those of residents, other visitors and our local environment. I think we have achieved that with the new Freedom Camping Bylaw," Cr Turner says.

A Great Community Effort Native Planting at Urumau Reserve 2021

You can expect an intimate experience when you help plant natives at Urumau. Season 2021 was no different. The beauty of this programme is that every aspect of it is done by people who live locally. It's a real citizen science project in action that builds local community knowledge on the biodiversity in this area. The community become the hands-on experts in our own place.

From collecting seeds to growing seedlings, everything is experimental. Small teams of locals have learned what the local species are and have rough knowledge of when the seeds are ready to collect. Those seeds are then cleaned and stored in our own seed library. Word of mouth or previous experience then has locals asking for seed to germinate at home. Some years loads of seed germinate and other years there isn't much. Seeds collected last year become the plants for this year as well as other stocks from our community nursery. Unfortunately for the team this year only 64 plants were added to our stocks from last year's seeds. Covid 19 had a real impact on when we could collect seed and unfortunately lock down occurred at the best time to collect seed.

Despite low numbers of new season plant stocks into the nursery, we hold more plants from previous years collections at our two-community nurseries. That meant we were able to plant 380 plants at Urumau this season., with a variety of people participating in the planting.

For the first time the Banks Peninsula Greens were involved. Quite a few of their members live in Lyttelton, and they started the planting effort

for the season. Regular reserve helper Ietje van Stolk was the instigator of this idea. She gathered 16 of her fellow Greens including MP Eugenie Sage and our ECAN Councillor Vicky Southworth to give a helping hand. Our planting became the perfect excuse for the Greens to do something practical locally as well as socially. As you would imagine, quite a few people who attended have planted before. It was interesting to find the planting methods we apply were different to what some of them had experienced at other planting days. For instance, in Lyttelton we dig ledges for each plant, we don't install plant cages, we have comprehensive water modelling for the entire season, and we plant larger sized plants.

A further two planting days were organised before Covid 19 stymied work again. Facebook is helpful to connect with locals as well as people we connect with up at the reserve. Twenty-four people responded to the call for help and a further 150 plants went in the ground.

Our season was supposed to be capped off with our Lyttelton Arms Team. That's always the highlight of the season with all the planters heading back to the Arms for a social gathering. We were all set to go and Covid lockdown got in the way again. Our team of 20 had to be stood down. Luckily the planting effort was able to continue. Once back at Covid level 2 we invited small groups under the Lyttelton Arms banner up to complete the job. This was a really nice way to finish the work off. Community Board member Reuben Davidson was one who came up to lend a hand. He received very personalised attention and undertook some really good planting for us.

My new neighbours also lent a hand. Our team really enjoyed having Arlo, Sylvie, Graeme and Laura spend a morning with us. I thought this photo of Arlo really summed up the season. While it was disjointed and not quite what we had planned everyone who came up had a good time and felt a sense of achievement getting the community nurtured plants into the ground.

Have Your Say – Bus 28

Always a Hot Topic in Lyttelton

The 28 bus is the main form of public transport in and out of Lyttelton. ECAN has some new proposals for the route, and they want to hear your views before December 5th.

Just what is being proposed with route 28?

- It is to be extended to the Airport.
- It will be re-routed to the bus exchange via Ara with buses getting to town via Waltham Road rather than Columbo Street.
- It will be renamed Port to Port
- Operated with electric buses
- Service frequency to increase to every 15 minutes until 6pm weekdays, every 20 mins on Saturdays and every 30 mins on Sundays
- The new service would commence in 2023

Let **ECAN** know your thoughts on these changes. For example, these changes do not impact the service from Lyttelton to Rāpaki. That means under this proposal frequencies on this extension of the route will remain at just three services per day.

Purchasing electric buses cost more. Would you be happy to have a rate increase to support a more environmentally form of transport?

Just what do you use this service for? If you are a shopper, the proposed service will still stop at the bus exchange but not stop at South City or Sydenham. The proposed route would enable you to have greater access to Moorhouse Avenue shops and the Airport Shopping precinct instead. If you are a student stopping outside Ara might be very useful to you. If you are a frequent air traveller this could be just what you have been waiting for.

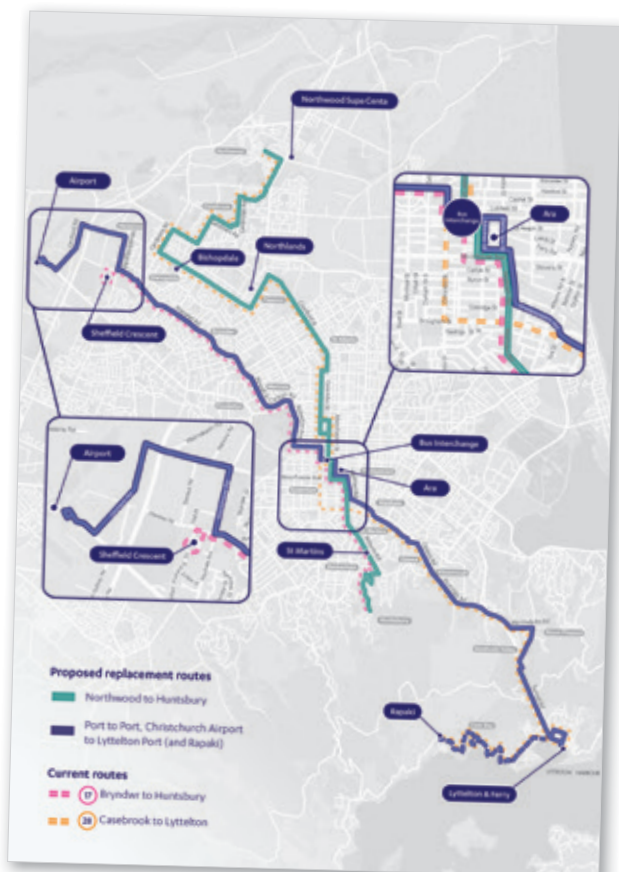

Historic Rāpaki Schoolhouse to be conserved

An important part of Te Hapū o Ngāti Wheke history will be preserved for future generations with the help of a \$71,000 Heritage Incentive Grant.

Rāpaki School was constructed around 1874, part of a network of village primary schools established by the Native Department to provide education for children in Ngāi Tahu communities. A grant to support its relocation and conservation was approved by the Christchurch City Council's Sustainability and Community Resilience Committee.

The building served as a school for 70 years and since its closure has continued to play an important role as a meeting and learning space for hapū members. The grant will cover an estimated 30 percent of the costs involved in the relocation, conservation and upgrade work. Rāpaki Reserves Trust is seeking further funding from the Rata Foundation and Parkinson Trust.

"The Rāpaki School building plays an important role in the cultural and social history of this area," says Committee Chair Councillor Sara Templeton.

"Preserving it for ongoing use by hapū and manuhiri/visitors is in keeping with the Council's aim to maintain and protect our built and cultural heritage."

Because the building is located close to a cliff edge it is at risk from coastal erosion and needs to be moved and relocated five metres to the east, away from the cliff. A new pile foundation will be required along with insulation, structural and electrical upgrades, toilet facilities and accessible access.

Those who plan to use the building include Whakaraupō Carving Centre and Conservation Volunteers New Zealand who are working on habitat restoration in the area.

Rāpaki School is a rare example of a nineteenth century building that has survived and remained in use in a Ngāi Tahu village to the present day.

Once the project is complete the building will be included in events such as the Christchurch Heritage Festival, tours of Māori architecture in Ōtautahi and the Open Christchurch Festival.

Clubhouse and church supported with heritage grants

A clubhouse completed in 1923 for the Canterbury Yacht and Motorboat Club is one step closer to finding a new, permanent home beside the Governors Bay Jetty.

It comes after a grant of \$58,500 was made today by the Christchurch City Council Sustainability and Community Resilience Committee.

The money will help with the cost of moving and upgrading the building.

A familiar landmark in Dampier Bay for 80 years, the clubhouse has been used by the Sea Scouts, the Dampier Bay Maritime Club and many other groups. When the Lyttelton Port Company redeveloped the area, they shifted the building off the water onto port land and sold it to four local supporters for \$1. It was subsequently purchased by the Governors Bay Jetty Trust who plan to renovate it for use as a community boat house.

Once relocated, the building will be restored and repaired so it can begin life anew. Work will include new pile foundations in the water, conservation of the timber structure, electrical upgrades and new toilet

facilities. The trust estimates the total cost of the works to be \$405,000. The proposed new site itself has special significance as the place where craftsman and boat builder Lionel Jefcoate's boat shed once stood.

Lyttelton church memorial

Also supported with funding is a planned memorial dedicated to

the now-demolished St Joseph the Worker Catholic Church.

Consecrated in 1865, St Joseph's was the first Catholic stone church built in the South Island but was lost in the 2010-11 earthquakes.

The Friends of St Joseph the Worker Memorial Charitable Trust are fundraising to create a memorial to the building and its community.

The Committee gave a \$7,490 grant to help the trust repair and restore the original iron gates, archway and railings which have suffered damage and deterioration.

These will be used to create a memorial along the Winchester Street frontage where the church used to sit.

Once built, the trust is planning a second project involving a memorial seat, information panels and a display of significant items including two crucifixes and the church bell.
