Draft Lyttelton Master Plan

Feedback on Plans to Rebuild Lyttelton Available

Lyttelton is a place which is treasured by many. It is also at a pivotal moment in its history, and taking care to plan the next stages of Lyttelton's transformation is essential. The Draft Lyttelton Master Plan [November 2011] sets out a direction for the Lyttelton township and the critical actions to achieve this, for community consideration and submissions.

In total, 197 submissions were made on the draft Plan. 32% were provided on the official submission form for the Plan; 24% through the Have Your Say form; and 44% as free form submissions, often in the form of a letter-style submission provided via an electronic document or by the submitter providing a submission formatted similarly to the official submission form.


Overall, far more actions were *liked* (1808) than *disliked* (232). The actions or initiatives that were liked the most included: Move Port access off Norwich Quay [Heads of Agreement]; A new civic square; Support for a creative hub of affordable workspace; Appointment of a Lyttelton case manager; Pedestrian links from London Street to Norwich Quay; and around town. The actions that were disliked the most were: Movement and the waterfront; Rooftop park between, or on a combined, Lyttelton Library and Service Centre; Parking investigations; London Street public realm enhancements and public event opportunities; Lyttelton War Memorial Cenotaph relocation investigation and reinstatement. When the most *liked*, *disliked*, *important* and *urgent* actions are considered together, the actions that stood out as the most significant included: Move Port access off Norwich Quay; A new civic square; Support for a creative hub of affordable workspace; Appoint a Lyttelton case manager; and Donald Street arts precinct and art in the street.

The summary of submissions is just that - a summary of the public's response to the Draft Lyttelton Master Plan. It does not include what Council staff think should be done in respect to that response. A summary of submissions will be appended to the report to the Lyttelton Mt Herbert Community Board on 17th April, and the Council on 3 May 2012. The report will contain recommendations from Council staff regarding the hearing of submissions, and should the Council decide not to hear submissions, how the Draft Lyttelton Master Plan should be amended before being adopted by the Council.

Lyttel Piko Delivers a Unique Opportunity for Lyttelton

So, you may be wondering what is happening with Lyttel Piko these days. Many of you will have heard that due to the challenges faced over the last year by our sister shop in town, we here in Lyttelton were faced with the possibility of closure. In response, we have decided to create the Harbour Co-op Limited in which you, the community, have an opportunity to own the business.

The Co-op


The Harbour Co-op Limited is being registered and is undergoing the last legal touches to become official – a much bigger task than originally expected – with a constitution written from scratch and a detailed financial prospectus – we are now far more familiar with the Company's Act, the Co-operative Companies Act and the Securities Act than we ever anticipated. It will, to our knowledge, be the only consumer owned grocery store in the country. But what's more is that we are planning a Multi-stakeholder Co-op – which is an exciting evolution of more traditional forms of co-ops and has been gaining in popularity worldwide. What this model will do is provide a method of ownership for the major stakeholders in the business. By doing this we are providing a method of ownership that will appropriately reflect the unique interests and involvement. An elected board will reflect each share class proportional to their relative stake in the business and balance will be achieved by not allowing any one class to hold an absolute majority. But most importantly – everyone who is a transacting member of the Co-op will have a voice.

Becoming a Household Member

We are still waiting on official approval from the Companies Office and Financial Markets Authority before we can begin selling shares, but a membership enrolment form will be available shortly which will outline all of the nitty gritty details. Our goal is to have at least 150 members by the end of March, thus meeting the purchase deadline we have with the Te Whanau Trust [the legal entity of Piko Wholefoods] and at which time the Harbour Co-op will begin trading and the shop will be able to stay in our community. A one-time ownership share costs \$365 per household. No other financial contribution is required, other than your continued patronage at the shop – the more you transact, the greater your reward. Your level of involvement will be as much as you wish it to be.

Your time is valuable to the Co-op, but not compulsory. There will be opportunities for a wide range of contributions – through quarterly working bees, periodic meetings of small task groups, or regularly scheduled or flexible hours working in the shop – you can give something more than just money to the Co-op.

Growing Local

What this model achieves is the means to secure local resilience for the future by supporting and eliciting local production. Having a producer share class means that the Co-op can identify current demands and facilitate supply through small local growers who might otherwise struggle with daunting elements such as processing, distribution and marketing. If there are crops that can be grown here or things that we can make here and we as a community feel that they would increase our 'social capital' – by using our collective resources, we can find a way to grow or make them – providing for a robust local economy.

Benefits

One of the key benefits of ownership in the Harbour Co-op will be access to these 'Co-op produced' goods at a discounted rate, along with other select discounted items – mainly focusing on local and bulk goods. But if you are thinking of investing in the Co-op solely as a way to save or even make money then you may need to reconsider. This investment is in our community, our health, and our long term resilience.

Local Resilience

We are looking to plug the holes that drain our community of wealth, be it financial or physical. We are dreaming of an entity that can provide for the legal and transparent exchange of vital human goods and services that will help shield our community from potential global calamities ahead – a complete and thriving local economy with trading governed by goodwill rather than greed.

For the last six weeks a group of incredibly dedicated and talented folks have been meeting weekly and burning the midnight oil to make it all happen. Many thanks to the committee and especially Heather Lander– who must now be New Zealand's leading self-taught legal authority on consumer co-ops as well as having put together our website in a matter of days.

A lot of time has been gifted to this project over the last couple of months and I would like to extend my personal gratitude to all of those who have given so much of themselves to make sure that the little shop that my partner Judith and I started four and a half years ago will stay in Lyttelton and will continue to grow and serve the community that we love.

Together we can do things that we could not possibly do separately. It will have to start with generosity – a true feeling of 'us', and an understanding of what it means when we come together and look after each other. One Year On

Looking Forward as Plans Come Together

Two weeks after the February 2011 earthquake, this cottage in Canterbury Street represented the beginning of demolition in Lyttelton. Deconstructed under the skill and watchful eye of local resident Chris Morrison, the cottage was not subjected to the “wrecking ball” but rather deliberately brought down piece by piece, recycling as much as was humanly possible, and for what couldn’t be saved was chopped into firewood and distributed amongst Lyttelton’s elderly residents, or collected by others from the side of the street. Chances are high that most of the cottage never left the Harbour region.

Property owner Lynnette Baird recalls the February earthquake and demolition, saying “as soon as the earthquake hit we knew the cottage couldn’t be saved; so our focus at the time was all about making the site safe so that our neighbours could move back home. Up until the moment this photograph was taken I believed I was coping quite well with the whole experience, but I have to confess to being quite emotional standing there and listening to the house groan, as if making one last effort to resist the deconstruction process.”

Twelve months on, and as they say, time heals most wounds. Lynnette and her husband are making plans to rebuild on the same site, with a design that pays respect to the cottage that used to occupy the site. Acknowledging that this cottage in Canterbury Street was the first home to be demolished after the February earthquake, this rebuild may well be ahead of other Lyttelton residential homes in terms of the rebuilding process. Over the coming weeks, and months, Lynnette will be sharing her experience and knowledge with the planning, design, resource consent, and building process.

LIFT Library

Interesting Reading Assured

From humble beginnings Lyttelton's new library started through the simple art of sharing books amongst a group of like minded individuals. Three months on and Lyttelton's LIFT library is quickly gaining popularity across all sectors of the local community. The LIFT Library has evolved from conception to active lending, and like many initiatives in Lyttelton, the catalyst to this project happened in February 2011. Librarian Juliet Adams talks us through the past twelve months - from when her daughter Jenny lost Ground; to travelling back to China for three months; and then returning to Lyttelton wondering 'what is next'.

Convincing over the late winter months Juliet started reviewing books and providing an 8-10 page summaries for busy Lyttelton people. Most of the books reviewed were in preparation of the Lyttelton Time Bank Hui. It was during this time that Juliet hosted Carterton resident Helen Dew, from Living Economies, where it became apparent that members of the Lyttelton community were looking for an alternative range of reading material. And so, through the donation and lending of books from Living Economies, Project Lyttelton and a range of generous Lyttelton residents, the LIFT Library now offers more than 175 titles covering everything from healthy living to social improvement; through to thought provoking conversation starters such as alternative currencies and analysis on why the monetary system has failed us all.

For most of us the phrases economics, or alternative currencies, does not conjure up the same feel good emotions as going on holiday, but we can all associate with credit card debt and interest charges. Which leads to the question: who really benefits from your debt? Through questions like this, the LIFT Library not only challenges us to stop and think; but also provides the resources to better understand our troubled economic environment.

One such book in particular, *"The Wealth of Nature – Economics as if Survival Mattered"* by John Greer has impressed Juliet, and is highly recommended reading as an entry level discussion into economics. In his book, Greer analyses the mistakes of modern day economics in an easy to understand, fresh thinking manner that is delivered with humour and leaves you with a clear understanding on why current economic system has failed.

The Lyttelton LIFT Library is presently established at the librarian's house in Voelas Road, but don't let that stop you from calling Juliet on 03 328 8139 to arrange a time to peruse the shelves or borrow any of the wide selection of books or magazines on offer.

Lifetime membership to the Lyttelton LIFT Library is just \$20 per family or household; and will open your mind to new possibilities. As an added service for members, Juliet can email you a list of the books available, and can drop off your reading choice to your work or home within the Lyttelton, Cass Bay or Rapaki area; and your returning books can be conveniently left at the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre or Project Lyttelton.



Time Ball East Works

Sumner Road and Reserve Terrace

Rock scaling and meshing the rock face above Sumner Road between the intersection with Reserve Terrace and the locked gates on Sumner Road and adjacent to where the Time Ball Station was will commence on 12 March and continue for approximately three weeks. The sound of drilling and possibly some blasting may be heard during the works. The remediation programme has been designed to minimise disruption to local residents. A section of the road between No.1 Reserve Terrace and No.61 Sumner Road may be closed for periods of up to 10 minutes while rock is scaled off the face and drilling work is being completed.

earthquake rock fall maps

The Christchurch City Council has released a series of 180 maps showing the locations of rock sources in the Port Hills regions, and where rocks have fallen as a result of the recent seismic activity. The key on the maps describes three main areas: Bluff Talus - where debris has fallen from a bluff; Bluff Insitu - the location of a particular bluff; or Bluff Envelope - the general location of a bluff that is too dangerous to allow closer inspection. Kerbside Wheelie Bin Campaign

Close the Lid or No Collection

Christchurch City Council are about to launch a kerbside wheelie bin campaign. The campaign's key message "bin lids must be shut flat on collection day" is designed to remind residents that placing a wheelie bin out at the kerbside for collection, with its lid not shut flat, may result in the bin's contents not being collected. Council's kerbside contractors will not collect bins if lids are left open or if bins are overloaded with material. Council says to ensure the waste is collected in a safe and efficient manner bin lids must be shut completely flat. Any bins that do not have their lids shut flat will have a sticker placed on them during collection, explaining why the material has not been collected by the kerbside collection contractor.

Council Reduces Water Restrictions

Level 3 Reduces to Level 2

Level 2 water restrictions mean the public will be able to water outdoors everyday, and at any time, using hand-held hoses and watering cans. However, the use of sprinklers and irrigation systems is still prohibited. Council City Water and Waste Manager, Mark Christison says the major work to wells and reservoirs is progressing quickly, which is great news for the City. Mr Christison says that if repairs to the water supply network remain steady, public support of the restrictions continues and the weather stays relatively cool, water restrictions could be completely lifted by April this year.





Lyttelton resident Bettina Evans set out after the September 2010 Earthquake to record the stories of random people in Lyttelton to create a kaleidoscope of stories specific to Lyttelton. When the February 2011 earthquake hit it seemed natural to continue collecting stories. The September interviews were recorded between one and six weeks after the quake, the February interviews were recorded between three and eight weeks after the quake. Bettina has left the transcripts in their raw state to preserve the individual voice of each speaker and also to retain some of the emotions and confusions that are so much more obvious in speech than written word. A common theme in all the February interviews was the appreciation of the community spirit of Lyttelton as well as Christchurch, and the opportunities arising from that. Bettina says "she feels privileged listening to all the stories and hopes that you enjoy reading them as much as she did." Much has been written about the Canterbury region, yet there is little published information about the settlers' voyage out to New Zealand, and the first establishment year in Lyttelton. Local histories and guide books have tended to focus on the period after 1851. Author Colin Amodeo spent a year researching the arrival of the first settlers during the summer of 1850-51, hence the title *The Summer Ships*: Charlotte Jane, Randolph, Sir George Seymour, Cressy, Castle Eden and Isabella Hercus. From the book emerges a picture of courageous young people, mostly in their twenties and thirties with young families, who were prepared to travel to the other side of the world to begin a new life. *The Summer Ships* is not an academic history, it is primarily a story intended to help the reader understand the way Canterbury came into being, with a focus on the people.
