Lyttelton in the Spot Light

What is the essence of this community?

On Thursday May 10th Lyttelton was visited by a broad delegation of Civil Defence representatives and their Australian counterparts. Lead by John Hamilton, New Zealand's Director of Civil Defence and Emergency Management, the Lyttelton representatives were introduced to Cam Derry who heads up the equivalent government department in Australia and his college Kerry, plus team members from Wellington and the Canterbury area.

The team came to meet Lyttelton community group leaders who were directly involved in the emergency and recovery response from the earthquakes. They were seeking to find out our community story. How and why did this area perform so well during the crisis and it's aftermath? What did we attribute our success to? What have we got to share with the world?

Representing our community was Gary Manch [Lyttelton Police], Pete Dawson [St Johns], Jules Lee [Lyttelton Harbour Basin Community Civil Defence], Margaret Jefferies [Project Lyttelton], Christine Wilson [Lyttelton Community House], Andrew Turner [Lyttelton Harbour Business Association], Wendy Everingham [Project Lyttelton and Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre] and members of the Lyttelton based Civil Defence team Pat Owen and Liz Briggs.

Everyone had the opportunity to talk about their experiences and why they felt Lyttelton had performed well. In the early days following February 22nd, it was acknowledged how fortunate Lyttelton was to have been hosting the New Zealand Navy. And mixed in with the Navy was the excellent local team work; the culture of volunteerism in Lyttelton provided a wealth of knowledge across various community groups; and neighbours helping neighbours was all part of the recipe that got us through the natural disaster so well.

Living in a village with defined boundaries also makes these connections easier. Added to that was the usefulness of the Lyttelton Timebank and the great communication networks that Lyttelton has. Years of actively building our community has also been a major contributing factor, plus the realisation by most that being geographically isolated from Christchurch City, Lyttelton is on its own in an emergency so we have to take responsibility for ourselves and those around us.

There is also an underlying realisation amongst some residents in the township that we need to be self sufficient, not only for emergencies but world events. Climate change, peak oil, currency instability and civil unrest are all possible clouds on the horizon. So many people have been gearing up to be more local and less reliant on the wider world.

All of these things helped with Lyttelton's community response and helped Lyttelton to move forward into the future with optimism and energy.

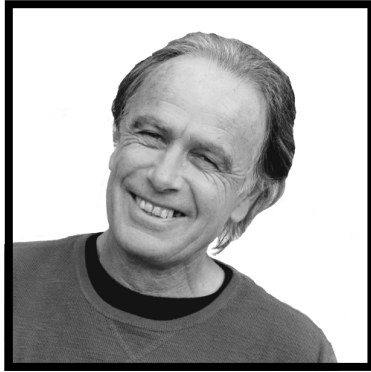

Festival of Lights: Countdown

24 Days until the Lyttelton Harbour Festival of Lights

Al Park probably doesn't need an introduction with his life time of musical and music industry accomplishments. However what you might not be aware is the valued role he plays selecting the Lyttelton Harbour Festival of Lights main stage music line ups each year. In a purely voluntary capacity, that's his role on the festival team and one of the ways that he can contribute personally to the vibrancy of the Lyttelton community. "I'm looking to show case the top acts in Port. We have some of the best acts in the country and it's the role of the festival to highlight our musicians and to inspire up and coming bands" he said. This year the line up includes two rock bands and two country/pop style bands.

The Greyhounds play for the first time. An authentic blue grass feel, the band is a combination of musicians from the Unfaithful Ways, the Eastern and Run-Around Sue. Lupus Lunar features for the first time. Describing themselves as "Earworm Rock" the band features local musician Dylan Hawes. Feature acts for the Festival of Lights in 2012 will be the Unfaithful Ways headed by our own Marlon Williams, who by the time of the festival may have won some music awards in Gore and Lindon Puffin promoting his new album Hope Holiday plus many of his older and most popular songs.

Al says when it comes to the festival he's often asked about the running order. "Line ups are determined by the demographics", he says. This is a family festival in the early hours of the evening and then it moves to the adult crowd later in the evening so he selects the line ups to mirror the audiences. He enthuses about his involvement in the event and you can tell that he never tires from putting on events. He knows what works. He knows how to create something that looks seamless and effortless. He loves show casing our talented artists. He enjoys that as a community we are totally self sufficient. "We have all the talents here to create our special events. How amazing is that?" After all these years he's still really enthusiastic about the festival and says "helping the team connects me back to this community plus gives me a big buzz and loads of satisfaction. I love it".

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Ray moved to Lyttelton at the start of October 2008, arriving around 8pm on a Friday night, and being aware of the Lava Bar, Ray dropped his bags onto the floor and quickly came to realise that the Lava Bar and he “got on just fine”. The next night Ray watched The Butler at The Loons, and by Sunday was enjoying the musical talents of Carmel Courtney on Freemans deck. In Ray’s words “the die was cast” and he was here to stay.

After February 22, Ray says he was lucky to immediately rent 24 Dublin Street, and to this day Ray is using a Bunnings fold out picnic table as his desk. With humour he exclaims “funny how you get used to things. From being one of the partners in a reasonably large firm in Wanaka, now I do it all – I get the mail, print the letters, take copies, lick the stamps – all the while try and give practical efficient legal advice, whatever it takes! And I am loving it!”

Here in Lyttelton Ray’s diverse skills suits the needs of Lyttelton residents; and if you think you have a problem that will have Ray heading for the law books, his Queenstown office has a huge depth of experience and expertise which can be called on at any time. Since September 2010, Ray’s skills are in demand. With a background in resource management he is familiar with applications for consent, existing use rights, development levies and such like. In addition there are the negotiations for residents battling insurance companies and EQC for fair and prompt payouts for the total damage sustained. And all the time, Ray has been in thick of all this unsettlement on a personal level so he knows what people are going through.

Having been located in temporary premises on Dublin Street, Ray says now is the time to get some permanency back into his life. **Over the weekend of 19 May, he is moving the Mactodd office to the rooms above Bells Pharmacy at 50 London Street. Entry to Ray’s new office is a few metres down the access way between Bells Pharmacy and Portico.** The stairs inside the door take you up to his rooms, and clients should note that while the stairs are historically steep, Ray is very happy to meet with you at the bottom of the stairs, or in the car – you just need to give him a call.

Ray says that “Lyttelton has been very supportive of having a local solicitor living and working in their midst. I guess they get legal experience and advice without having to head into town and all that entails now. I very much appreciate that support. I try and work just from Tuesday to Friday but am always happy to see people out of hours. As I have always said, it costs nothing to make an appointment and pop into the office to see if I can help you. That is still the case.”

On the Brink of New Beginnings

Harbour Co-Op Needs More Members

Lyttelton’s proposed Harbour Co-Operative needs just a few more people to form the first consumer co-operative grocery store in New Zealand since the gold mining days of the 1860’s. The process started from the seed of an idea last year when the current owners of Piko Wholefoods decided to sell the Lyttel Piko business after the February 22 earthquake.

Over the past several months a tireless volunteer team of people, including: Brian Rick, Dana Dopleach, Doug Jenkinson, Heather Lander, Jenny Garing, Kerry Donnelly, Marysia Krawczyk, Nina Srot and others, have dedicated their time to building the framework around turning Lyttel Piko into a community-owned cooperative.

In March the Harbour Co-Op was registered at the Companies Office, with the prospectus, investment statement and application details released on 28 March. This means that the customers and residents of the Lyttelton Harbour region have been given the opportunity to buy shares in a new cooperative and become its owners.

Harbour Co-Op Needs More Members

Priced at \$365 per share [being one share per household], around 130 people have applied and paid for a share in the Harbour Co-Op over the past six weeks raising more than \$48,000. With just a few more people the Lyttel Piko business can be purchased by the Harbour Co-Op for the Lyttelton community.

For shareholders, the benefits will include price breaks on selected items, bulk buying discounts, access to workshops and seminars, more open sharing of information, and potentially profit sharing.

But more importantly – the Lyttelton Harbour community will retain this grocery shop in our community, and members will have a direct say in how the shop is run. All members/owners will have an equal vote on major issues and will elect a board of directors which will steer and oversee the operations of the business.

Talk about a “Lyttel town that could”!

Although the Harbour Co-Op may not be trading yet, it doesn't mean that there are no benefits of membership. Starting on Wednesday, May 16th from 4-5pm, the Harbour Co-op will be hosting weekly workshops aimed to educate and empower our members to feed and heal their own bodies. Alternate times will be available in the future to suit different schedules.

No Hall, No Problem for Bill

Contra Dancing Returns to Lyttelton

In many communities across the country, if you wanted to organise a dance night you would hire the local hall. But here in Lyttelton the hall has been closed due to earthquake damage. Not one to be deterred, Bill and Liz Baritompia have started hosting contra dance nights, every Thursday from 7.30pm, at their home in Cass Bay.

Meeting Bill and Liz for the first time, any pre thought that you might be invading their private space is quickly dispelled. From the genuinely warm and inviting greeting, one is led through to a light an open living space with purpose built wall to wall timber flooring for dancing and soaring ceilings. With plenty of chairs scattered around the outer edges of the room, this is a space that calls out to the dancer within – even to those of us with two left feet!

Bill has been involved in music and dance “pretty much all his life”. Previously known for forming a bush band and hosting barn dances, Bill is actively involved in the monthly contra dance nights at the Addington school hall where anywhere between 40 to 60 people arrive to join in the fun and social outing. In terms of ability and age, both according to Bill are quite diverse. Beginners, so long as they can count to eight, will enjoy an evening just as much as a well seasoned dancer, with the age group varying from teenagers to grandparents.

With step by step instruction, contra dance nights are an all inclusive environment, and not a class environment. The philosophy behind contra dancing is quite simple: relax and just have fun - with lots of clapping, stomping, laughter and music too. Contra dance nights are about getting out of the house, meeting new people, having some fun and being social – the perfect recipe for those winter nights ahead.

Part of the enjoyment of contra dancing, is the live music. In Addington, more often than not, the band on the night is a “scratch band” – one that is formed by the musicians who arrive on the night. Here in Lyttelton, it is envisaged that at least once a month live music can be organised, and Bill is keen on supporting up and coming local musicians to achieve this.

Oxford Street Over Bridge

Temporary Repairs to Being

Lyttelton Port Company are constantly monitoring and undertaking inspections of structures around our Port. These inspections have revealed damage to the last span on the Jetty 2 side of the Oxford Street over bridge.

To provide additional support to the bridge our engineers, Concrete Protection and Repair [CPR], and our Civil Maintenance team will undertake work to strengthen and secure this area. This will involve making connections between the bridge spans and installing temporary prop beams alongside.

During this work a 50m section at the northern end of the Oxford St over bridge will be reduced down to one lane. Fulton Hogan have confirmed a traffic management plan and have proposed to have the cordon and signage in place early this week. Work is scheduled to take two weeks.

With the traffic reduced to one lane, ferry passengers and other pedestrians must now take extra care to keep to the footpath as buses and bulk cargo trucks will still have access on the over bridge.

Corsair Bay Sea Wall [South]

Work started last week on the scheduled rebuild of the sea wall on the south side off the beach at Corsair Bay. Work involves removing of the existing rock, placing of filter fabric to prevent removal of material by wave action, importing larger sized rock to form the toe of the wall and replacement of the existing rock over the filter fabric. The wall will be reformed at a less steep angle to better dissipate the energy of the waves during storm events. Work is likely to be completed with the week.

ANZAC Day Poppy Appeal

The Lyttelton RSA Charitable Trust wishes to sincerely thank the Lyttelton Harbour and Bays community for their very generous support of our annual Poppy Day Appeal in support of the welfare needs of our Defence Force veterans. Author: Vivian Hutchinson and NZ Social Entrepreneur Fellowship

Where Being Green is All White

Local Cass Bay resident Mary Bedford is repainting her house roof white in response to a study undertaken by Concordia University in Canada that painting roofs white and using light-coloured materials to surface roads and pavements would not only make places cooler in summer, it would save the same amount of carbon as taking all the cars in the world off the roads for 50 years.

Mary says that "It is a brilliant and simple way to go green. So appropriate for Christchurch when many new roofs are being made or older ones repainted. Our roof is half white now!".

White Roofs is a simple idea offering one of the fastest and lowest cost ways of helping reduce global warming by mimicking how the polar icecaps reflect sunlight back into space and cool the planet.

Sunlight falling on a flat white roof is significantly reflected back through the atmosphere into space, but sunlight on a dark roof is mostly absorbed and converted into heat, which can't pass back into space because it is blocked by the greenhouse gases in the atmosphere. The atmosphere is transparent to sunlight but opaque to the much longer wavelengths of heat and that is why a white roof helps cool the planet and a dark roof warms the planet.

100 square metre of flat white roof cancels roughly 10 tonne CO2 emissions. Researchers at the Heat Island Group, Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory, California in a 2009 study found that a flat white roof of 100 square metre (the size of an average house in Lyttelton without a garage), produces annual global cooling that cancels the warming of roughly 10 tonne of CO2 emissions.

Their research also indicates that: "If roofs are changed from their current dark colour to white for flat roofs and cool colours for sloped roofs for urban areas around the world, we can offset 24 billion tonnes of CO2 ... it's the equivalent of taking half of the cars in the world (300 million cars) off the road for every year of the 20 year life time of the paint."

Leading the WhiteRoof movement are residents of Waihi Beach who have a higher proportion of white roofs than any other suburb in New Zealand. Of the houses sampled in this example aerial image, twenty one homes of the forty five have white or off-white roofs. According to Whiteroofs.org.nz, it seems that people in Waihi Beach go white because they feel the heat there in summer, and some deliberately choose white knowing the benefits.

Resene's discount offer also extends to their CoolColour roof paint as a valuable alternative for example in districts where town planning regulations allow only dark, or in cases where an immediate neighbour's house is overlooking your roof and you feel an off-white might cause glare to them, or for those not that keen on a white roof but want to do something about global warming.

CanCERN Green Zone Expo

What do You Want to Learn

CanCERN has been on CERA's case for a long time now about getting meaningful information out to those in the Green Zones. The idea of an "Expo" of some sort has been floated and seems to be gaining traction. There are pros and cons to holding an expo.

On the plus side, you are more likely to get all the players involved to an Expo and over a greater period of time you can go from one to the other until you have the information you need, and it makes sense. It is also a good way to hold information to account if you can eyeball each other across the room! There's also the space factor - video screens can be erected, concrete examples can be brought in, different things can be happening in different areas catering to different groups.

On the down side, there's a risk the information is too generic to provide real clarity for your situation, there's the issue of crowds all trying to get their needs met and any expo is likely to be on the other side of town to where the affected communities are.

CanCERN are trying to get a sense of what people need answers to right now, by whom and in what way. They will be feeding this information into the CERA Community Wellbeing and Communications staff and giving them some direction on the best way to progress. CanCERN in no way want to let any more communication come out that misses the 'bottom line' of things that need to be understood so this is your opportunity to state what those bottom lines. But an expo can only be as good as the information CanCERN can get from you.

You can help make sure any such event meets your needs best by taking a few minutes to fill in the survey form which takes just a few short minutes. Please encourage others to do so as well. Please note: having an 'expo' does not mean there will not be more localised information sharing. This survey is an indicator, not a plan.

Council Recovery Plans Win National Planning Awards

Earthquake recovery plans developed by the Christchurch City Council have won two best practice awards at the annual New Zealand Planning Institute Awards. The Council's Draft Central City Recovery Plan for the redevelopment of the Central City won the Best Practice Award: Strategic Planning and Guidance and the Sydenham and Lyttelton Master Plans won the Best Practice Award: Consultation and Participation Strategies. The awards recognise outstanding creativity, innovation and service.

The Awards Panel also acknowledged the challenging post-disaster circumstances under which the Plan was prepared, with its short timeframe, significant public interest and uncertainty over the changing physical, economic and legislative environments. The extent of the consultation process for the Sydenham and Lyttelton Master Plans impressed the Awards Panel, from the site visits with community leaders, issue-specific focus groups, meetings with project stakeholders, public feedback presentations and submission opportunities to an understanding of people's physical and emotional loss, design and development ideas, and practical resource and investment realities.

"The process to develop the Sydenham and Lyttelton Draft Master Plans was a significant step in the recovery and regeneration of these two damaged centres. The Plans have addressed urgent core elements in the centres and provided emergency solutions to address the community's needs in the context of a clear long-term plan."

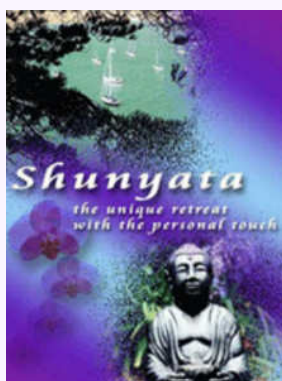
