London Street Brothels

A Future Look at Lyttelton

In 2009 when the Council consulted on the revocation of the Christchurch City Brothels (Location and Signage) Bylaw 2004, it proposed that there not be a new bylaw to take its place. The Council received many submissions arguing against the revocation. Since then the Council has been reviewing the need for a bylaw.

The Council has now decided there is a need for a bylaw as many of the known operator-run brothels were located in the Central City and their business premises are inaccessible or badly damaged following the 2011 earthquakes. These businesses may wish to temporarily or permanently relocate to other parts of the city. The Christchurch City Council is proposing to make a new bylaw to regulate the location of brothels and signs advertising adult services. Currently there are no bylaw controls around where a brothel can set up in the city. This proposed Bylaw will provide controls on where brothels, other than small owner-operator brothels, can operate.

As part of this new bylaw, the Lyttelton Town Centre Zone has been identified as an area that will be acceptable for brothels to open. The Township area is effectively non residential London Street, Norwich Quay and both Oxford Street and Canterbury Street [up to London Street]. In effect, should a brothel choose to open next door to the Lyttelton library, the hairdressers, the supermarket, or next to your favourite cafe spot – then they will be fully entitled to do so. No longer restricted to being first floor businesses, brothels can establish on the street level if they so desire.

The Council is quite clear in their recommendation that the Lyttelton Town Centre is an acceptable location for brothels. Imagine walking down London Street and being greeted with the littering of exotic signage, or men standing in door entrances offering the passerby an escape to Venus experience. Should this Council recommendation continue to proceed unchallenged; then we have to ask: is this the post quake future of Lyttelton we had all envisioned?

The Christchurch City Council will be holding four drop-in sessions where members of the public can view the proposed bylaw ask questions to Council staff and make a submission. **Tuesday, 26 June from 4.30pm to 6.30pm | The Lyttelton Club, 23 Dublin Street**

Inspiration Plus: Monetary Reform for New Zealand

LIFT Library Speaker Series with Raf Manji



An intimate audience listened intently to Raf Manji at the recent LIFT Library speaker series at Naval Point Club. Raf a former UK international banker spoke about his thoughts on the New Zealand monetary system and the lessons we need to be learning from the Global Financial Crisis.

Raf's talk highlighted how many of us take the money system for granted. We believe the system has always worked and will always work without questioning the actual workings of the system.

Our current system is an interest bearing debt based monetary system. There is very little real cash in the system. Over the years the system has evolved becoming more de-regulated from the 80's. Raf believes our current crisis has been caused by excessive growth of credit coupled by deregulation of the banking industry. This has been exacerbated by pricing signals that send our brightest minds into the banking industry to create even more complex debt products that effectively became the trigger for the financial meltdowns in the USA, Europe and other parts of the world.

He spoke about our general naivety about the system and often we believe authority figures that we have a well managed banking system in New Zealand. He really questions this and pointed to the recent finance company collapses. He then quoted that our "well managed" system has an external debt of \$147billion 71% of GDP and net public debt of \$41billion 20% of GDP. Since 1973 New Zealand has been spending more money than it earned. He quoted that since 1993 domestic credit has grown from 50 billion to 325 billion in 2012. The majority of this credit has been pushed into house purchases creating the situation in New Zealand where the housing market is very overvalued and unaffordable for many people.

How can New Zealand turn this situation around? How can we avoid our own melt down and beat our debt addiction? He had a couple of suggestions. "Why do we as a country, have to keep creating debt?" He suggested that the government should create money for its needs with no interest. Why should the state pay interest back to itself? He felt that as we retire bad debt (interest bearing) it should be replaced in the system with real cash. The Reserve Bank has the ability to do this.

Another suggestion was the government should place tighter limits on the amount of credit the private banks can lend. He also stressed that all of us need to realise that we need to live within our means and help rebuild the current account.

Another observation was the system needs reform and can't just be controlled by elites who often are removed from ordinary life. We need to actively participate in the process.

Raf finished suggesting that we create a third type of currency to add to the mix. Localised currencies could co-exist in New Zealand with a national currency. This would give local communities more control over the system, and enable the money flows to stay within New Zealand.

St Johns News

Banks Peninsula Area

This is the first of what we hope will become a regular column in the Lyttelton Review that will keep our community up to date with things St John.

Many people either forget or do not know that St John is a charity. We need to rely heavily on public donations now so that we can be there for our community when you need us. It's that simple. And that is the message St John hopes to get out there this year.

Monday 18 to Sunday 24 June is the St John Annual Appeal week, and our people are out across New Zealand raising awareness of the work we do – and raising funds for our services.

Every day St John ambulances respond to over 1,000 calls for help across the country. That's almost twice as many calls as we were answering 20 years ago. Even places like Lyttelton and Banks Peninsula are not immune from the growing demands. So, the support of our communities is invaluable to us, as without it, we could not continue provide the level of service that we currently do.

While St John receives funding from contracts with the Ministry of Health, the Accident Compensation Corporation and District Health Boards, this funding only partially covers the direct operating costs for our Ambulance Service. The remaining shortfall and the cost to run our community programmes is made up from fundraising, revenue from our commercial activities, as well as income from emergency ambulance part charges. Our challenge is that the demand is growing and the cost to provide these essential services is rising. Our formal funding levels unfortunately are not keep pace.



Caring for Life

Sometimes people forget St John is a charity and that we rely on donations to provide many of our community services. For example, St John has just started a new St John Youth Division in Lyttelton [we will be profiling this in a later column]. Our youth programme provides leadership and first aid skills to young people. This fantastic programme is funded by donations.

This week, look out for our St John collectors at the Lyttelton Farmers Market on Saturday 23 June. We appreciate your support, and your community will too. When you see one of our uniformed collectors please take the time to ask them about St John in Lyttelton and Banks Peninsula and find out how you can help through financial support of our St John Support Scheme or becoming a member of our Lyttelton Operations Team.

Community Groups to Engage with Council

There are two important dates coming up for Lyttelton: two meetings of the Christchurch City Council where important decisions affecting Lyttelton will be made.

On Thursday, June 21, one of the items on the Council's agenda will be the formal adoption of the Lyttelton Master Plan. We are yet to see the final cut of the plan, but Council staff have been working on changes to the plan based on the community's submissions to the final draft over the past few weeks, and the final version should be available on the Council's website on Monday 18th June, prior to its consideration at the Council meeting on Thursday 21st June. Lyttelton community groups, including the Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre, Project Lyttelton, the Lyttelton Harbour Business Association, and the Lyttelton Community Association will be making a deputation to the Council at that meeting, supporting adoption of the Master Plan itself, and suggesting between them that the most important quickly achievable projects in the plan are the Civic Square project, along with the need for a change to the district plan relaxing the on-site parking regulations in Lyttelton town centre. Both of these were strongly supported in the community's submissions to the draft plan, and for these community groups to speak to these at the Council meeting adds further strength to this community support. It is hoped that the Council will prioritise the Civic Square project, and the deputation will be supporting Council's purchase of the whole proposed site, and the inclusion of all of the site into a green space which will give the community an excellent gathering and meeting place in the Town Centre.

On Thursday, June 28, Council considers the adoption of their Annual Plan. This is essentially Council's "budget" for the next twelve months, commencing 1 July 2012. In the draft plan there is a budget for "*strategic land purchase*". The same community groups will again be making deputations to the full Council Meeting on June 28, to urge council to adopt the plan containing this budget, and to allocate some of those funds to Lyttelton so that the "strategic land purchase" of the site for the Civic Square project can proceed, and so that this project can then be achieved.

It has been great over the past year or so to see the Lyttelton Petanque Club site in the Town Centre be so well used. Thanks to the owners of the site, and to Gapfiller, this initiative has brought a public open space to the centre of town which has enabled many community activities and events to take place. The Civic Square project will ensure that there is a suitable open space in the Lyttelton Town Centre for its future needs, and has been widely supported within the community.

Ticehurst Road Works Notice

Scheduled Retaining Wall Repairs

SCIRT are making permanent repairs to retaining walls on Ticehurst Road. Works will commence on Monday, 18 June 2012 and are expected to be completed by the end of October 2012; as follows:

Section One	18 June to 20 July	10 – 12 Ticehurst Road
Section Two	21 July to 10 September	14 – 16 Ticehurst Road
Section Three	11 September to 17 October	18 – 24 Ticehurst Road

Please note that a full road closure will be in place for the duration of the works on each retaining wall. All dates given are approximate and maybe subject to change.

How will repairs to the retaining walls be done: The existing stone walls will be removed and the retaining wall slope excavated to a safe angle; Reinforced steel will be used to construct a new framework for the wall; Concrete blocks will be used to fill the framework and complete the walls; The walls will then be back filled using a trench compactor; and then the kerb and footpath will be installed and a graffiti guard paint will be used to coat the wall

Full road closures will be in place at different sections of Ticehurst Road as the works progress up the street. When a full road closure is in place there will be no driveway, footpath access, or on street parking during the day and night. Detours will be in place to redirect traffic. Signage will indicate temporary detour routes for the duration of work.

RUBBISH BINS: SCIRT would like to assist you with the collection of your Christchurch City Council rubbish and recycling bins while you have restricted vehicle access during road closures along Ticehurst Road. If you could **please put the bins out before 5:00pm every Wednesday**, and they will take them to the collection point outside the road closure and then return them to your property the next day. 
This whole magazine is enlightening and inspiring – and backs up the films we're currently showing in our Monday night film screenings, for the first few weeks on issues around food.
