Antarctica Close to Home

IceFest Speaker Series: Deep Field, Adventures and “Parkers”

Last Thursday was the beginning of IceFest in Lyttelton. Forty five people were introduced to history in the making as three wonderful speakers told their Antarctic tales.

Dr Margaret Bradshaw was a wealth of information. During her lifetime Margaret has made several trips to the ice continent with her work as a geologist, looking for rocks of a similar age to those she was studying in New Zealand. Many of the trips she went on were far from the Base Station so she was literally living and working on the ice in tents.

Did you know that if you make a trip to the ‘Deep Field’ it means you can only get there by Hercules landing on the ice? Planes then needed special booster jets attached to the aircraft called Jato Bottles so that they can take off again. A dangerous operation especially if some of the booster jet broke loose.

Most of us have never experienced temperatures below 20 or permanent daylight. What are the challenges that brings? Think about having a shower. When everything is below zero the water is permanently frozen. This means to have water you need to melt snow and that uses up precious fuel.

Margaret shared with the audience “every day is a bad hair day because you don’t have the water to wash yourself”. Imagine going to the toilet? Not easy in such conditions. “Today you must take a bucket and bags and all your waste needs to be taken back to the base station. In Antarctica you have to expect the unexpected” she said. It is a harsh but beautiful environment. Howling winds, snow storms, complete white outs, crevasses are all part of life on the ice.

Robin Burton presented a passionate history of his great grandfather. Bill Burton was a stoker on the Terra Nova with Scott. A guy from humble beginnings who joined the British Navy, and was then selected for the expedition from 8,000 applicants. His was a story of hardship and adventure that has added to the richness of Antarctic history.

David Ellis was the final presenter. From a family of adventurers and designers of Antarctic clothing the audience learnt about the family history. David was fortunate to grow up in a family where Hillary, Douglas and all the Antarctic explorers of that time were part of the extended family. Anything Antarctic was normal family life for him.

Within David's own family he told the story of the family business supplying adventurers with sleeping bags and clothes. To this day Antarctic clothing is manufactured in Dunedin for the New Zealand Antarctic Base by the family business. The Ellis's initially became famous for supplying adventurers with sleeping bags on the Everest expeditions.

With four penguin like mannequins David showed how the company had evolved jacket construction over the years. From the original hand-stitched down jackets to the high tech extreme cold weather jackets that they now make. Each generation of jacket design has been designed by his immediate relatives, and the most recent with 110 separate pieces of fabric was designed by David.

David's company have the exclusive contract for clothing with the New Zealand Antarctic Division. The current orange and black model is only worn by an exclusive few. All people who work on the base plus, John Key and Hillary Clinton have one and Bob Parker with his famous wind proof "Parker" which was then auctioned are the lucky few to have the privilege of wearing one.

We were also treated to stories of his father Murray's expeditions with Ed Hillary and others on the ice. Photos never seen before of the adventurers were presented. The famous tractors that were part of the Trans Antarctic Expedition trip to the South Pole featured with the team reaching the South Pole successfully on January 4, 1958. David reminisced on his fathers' time on the ice, the excitement and sense of adventure and exploration with no constraints.

Port Town Celebrates Brothel Free Status

Council Hearing Panel Deliberate on Proposed Brothel Bylaw

Late last week the Brothels Bylaw Hearing Panel met to continue deliberations on the proposed Christchurch City Council Brothels (Location and Commercial Sexual Services Signage) Bylaw 2012, following public consultation in June and July 2012 which attracted 193 submissions. The Hearing Panel deliberated further on the location of brothels, other than small owner operator brothels, to specific commercial areas in Christchurch and will not permit them to be located on a property that shares a boundary with, or is adjacent to, a school or preschool.

Brothels Bylaw Hearing Panel Chairperson Helen Broughton says while the Council cannot prohibit brothels, or be too restrictive about where they can locate, this proposed bylaw places controls on where operator-run brothels can set up business. "The panel's aim is to identify areas of the city where this activity is allowed, away from schools and preschools; and residential areas. The Hearing Panel has spent a lot of time looking at maps of possible locations for operator-run brothels. We have adjusted these maps to create buffer zones between residential areas and brothels and we considered today to suggest the removal of Lyttelton, Aranui and Wigram. Aranui and Wigram were removed because the creation of buffer zones around residential areas and schools meant the remaining areas were too small or isolated."

"In Lyttelton's case, the Hearing Panel considered the **overwhelming opposition from the local community** through the submission process, and also took into account the recently adopted Lyttelton Master Plan. We felt the work the Council and the community had done on the Master Plan to support Lyttelton's rebuild and recovery would not be consistent with allowing commercial brothels to set up business in the township."

"The Hearing Panel will meet again in the coming week to continue discussions on the Central City location and formally ratify the panel's recommendations. I am confident we will have a workable recommendation to take to full Council for their approval when they meet in late October," she says.

In March 2012, the Council asked staff to develop a new brothels bylaw to address any potential issues as many of the known operator-run brothels were located in the Central City and their business premises were inaccessible or badly damaged following the 2011 earthquakes. This was in recognition that businesses may wish to temporarily or permanently relocate and that there are no bylaw controls around where a brothel could set up in the city.

Algal Bloom, Not Oil, in Lyttelton Harbour

Environment Canterbury's Marine Oil Pollution Response Team has received reports of large oil spills over the past few days in Lyttelton Harbour. Regional On Scene Commander for Environment Canterbury Jim Dilley would like to re-assure the public that this has been investigated and samples taken have discovered it's algal bloom, not oil. "The algal bloom looks just like an oil spill when viewed from a distance but once you get closer you can see that the coloured particles are under the surface of the water, rather on the top where oil would float," he says.

Environment Canterbury's Senior Water Quality Scientist Coastal Dr. Lesley Bolton-Ritchie says that the algal bloom, *Mesodinium rubrum*, is a very common ciliate. "The discolouration of the water, which looks like oil, is due to the large amount of bloom that can change the seawater colour to brick red, brown or rusty red which it is known for. The reason for this outbreak of algal bloom could be a combination of sunny days and the water warming up mixed with recent rainfall causing the addition of nutrients into the water from rivers and streams. The bloom is non-toxic so the public has nothing to worry about," says Dr. Bolton-Ritchie.

The algal bloom was discovered in the outer part of the harbour last week and it appears to have been further pushed up the harbour by the wind. Christchurch City Council Facilities Rebuild Plan

Proposal to Prioritise Lyttelton Buildings

Andrew Turner shares some good news about three key Lyttelton facilities:

I attended a presentation by Christchurch City Council staff recently regarding the rebuild and repair of the Council's 1,600 residential and non-residential buildings across the City. These include everything from social housing to libraries to toilet blocks. The first phase of this programme, which is already under way and progressing well, requires a detailed engineering evaluation [DEE] of each of these 1,600 buildings. It is this stage of the process which has resulted in some buildings being closed as a result of concerns about their ability to withstand future earthquakes which have become apparent as a result of the DEE inspection [for example the building is deemed unfit for occupancy due to building damage, or being an earthquake prone building based on achieving less than 34% of the new building standard]. Whilst these closures are frustrating for communities, it is with the safety of users in mind that these decisions are made and implemented.

Clearly with 1,600 buildings requiring detailed investigation and a separate plan of action for each, there need to be priorities. Much as we would like it to happen, not all of this work can be done immediately due to the massive scale of the job. It was recently agreed by the Council's Community, Recreation and Culture Committee that a list of 27 significant facilities across the city should be prioritised for further investigation, funding, and where possible for repair as soon as possible. The committee has recommended that the full Council endorses this decision at a meeting on September 27th.

The good news for Lyttelton is that this list of significant facilities includes three key Council-owned buildings in Lyttelton, namely the Recreation Centre, the Swimming Pool, and the Information Centre and public toilets. The proposed top 27 were selected based on a set of criteria that considered a number of factors, including the impact a building's closure is having on its community. It is recommended that council staff should report back on these facilities by the end of the year at the latest, and it is likely that repairs on some of these facilities may have been approved by then, whereas more work may be required on other facilities beyond this date. It is important to note that the priority relates to action on each building – the end result for that facility can only be determined once initial investigations are complete. However, fast-tracking these first stages will clearly speed up this process.

It is encouraging that the three Lyttelton facilities identified for priority are the same facilities which since their closure have provoked the most discussion and concern within the Lyttelton Community.

These are the buildings we ourselves identified as priorities for attention. With a desperate shortage of recreation opportunities, meeting space and social gathering areas, the Lyttelton community has been concerned and frustrated about the loss of use of the Recreation Centre and the Swimming Pool. The toilets and Information Centre are a key part of our offering to the visitors we need to attract back to the town centre. The reopening of these facilities would be a big part of Lyttelton's recovery from the earthquakes and would be an important further step towards normality.

I welcome that these Lyttelton facilities have been recognised as high priority, and look forward to seeing actions on those facilities as soon as possible.

How to Quit Smoking, or Support Those Who Have

Today I hope to give you some options of how to have a go at quitting as not one way suits everyone. I don't want to focus on so much as why you should as this information is everywhere. We all know that smoking is bad for your health and your families. It is also really expensive and is not going to get any cheaper, so why not quit or support someone you know to have a go at quitting.

Most smokers want to quit and know they should, but life is often just not that simple. It is really hard to quit for life, the average smoker has fourteen or so attempts at quitting before they do for life. So don't be devastated if you quit and have a slip up, try and think why you did and what you could do better next time if anything and just have another go at quitting.

Should I Go Cold Turkey?

This is the hardest way to quit, and it is not recommended. It is the way lots of people try first especially if they have not been smoking for a few days because they have had a chest infection or the flu. Unsurprisingly it doesn't produce great long term results as the cravings and old habits kick back in as quickly as you feel better. Some people though this is a way that works for them.

Nicotine Patches, Gum, Lozenges and Electronic Cigarettes

This is by far the most popular way to quit. And it is what we and Quitline recommend you try first. We can now provide you these in the pharmacy for just the usual \$3.00 without having to go see anyone else or even call Quitline. It only costs \$3.00 for eight weeks of each type [except electronic cigarettes] so just come in and see us. It makes you about twice as likely to be successful compared with going cold turkey. It has been described as taking the edge of the pain of quitting. They also help stop those deep cravings that can drive you crazy.

Prescription Medications [Doctor only]

Nortriptyline, Zyban and Champix. These make you about three or four times more likely to be successful than just going cold turkey. They will cost you \$3.00 for 3 months worth of medication. Nortriptyline and Zyban both help by reducing the cravings and stabilising your mood. Both are very popular and regularly achieve good results with little or no side effects. Champix is the new one you may have seen on television. It is the first medication to be designed solely to help people quit smoking. It works two ways, one by stopping the cravings by acting just like nicotine does in your body. The other way is by blocking the nicotine you do have if you smoke so you will get little or no pleasure from it.

All these options give you the option of cutting back on cigarettes slowly while you are on the nicotine or medication. This makes it a lot easier than just having to stop straight away. Counselling is also a big thing. This is available many places, probably the most well recognised is with Quitline or at your local medical centre, and those who have had a go at quitting. Some people find this really helpful.

How to Support a Person Quitting

The average smoker has fourteen or so goes at quitting before they will finally quit, so it is important to help them give it a go, and not be discouraging if it fails it will generally be easier to quit next time. All people need support in different ways, so consider not what you would want, but what they would want. Here is what Quit Line recommends.

- Don't argue with or nag them about their smoking - but support them when they choose to quit.
- Let them know where they can find help and support to quit.
- Suggest going to places where people don't smoke.
- Go walking or exercising with them.
- Be there for them! Sometimes, a person who is trying not to smoke just needs someone to talk to.
- Show them how you deal with stress and boredom without smoking.
- Remind them they will enjoy socialising, eating and exercising much more than before.
- Focus on all the good things about quitting, and their own reasons for quitting.
- Give support and encouragement, even when they have a slip-up. A slip-up is not a relapse - it's just a slip-up.

Meet Lottie Harris: Project Lyttelton Manager

It's been an amazing journey with Project Lyttelton. A very small community organisation with few resources in the early days is blossoming into a successful social enterprise. Many used to murmur about the organisation not being sustainable but with sustained effort of the board and the gradual building up of staff, board members and other enthusiastic community members the organisation is future proofing its self. More and more people are attracted to the organisation in either a paid or voluntary capacity.

Key to the future proofing of Project Lyttelton is Lottie Harris. Lottie was appointed as the first paid part time manager of the organisation in July 2011. With her youthfulness, energy and vision of an organisation that is able to create its own wealth she's lifting the organisation to a new level and enabling full time volunteers Wendy Everingham and Margaret Jefferies to mentor from the sidelines rather than be fully involved in all the day to day activities of the organisation.

Lottie moved to New Zealand with husband Tim four years ago and like many of us a series of sudden events saw them fall in love with the township. Lottie said "We literally landed on a Thursday and stayed on a couch in Voelas Road. Saturday we visited the Farmers Market, met Margaret Jefferies, Sunday we received a Welcome Bag and on the Wednesday we were at the community garden". Their lives were intertwined with the township immediately.

Interestingly she tells us that she has another connection with the Banks Peninsula and Christchurch. "My mother actually came here back in the 1960's and lived in Gough's Bay. My brother was born at Christchurch hospital, so I had a desire to see this place she talked about".

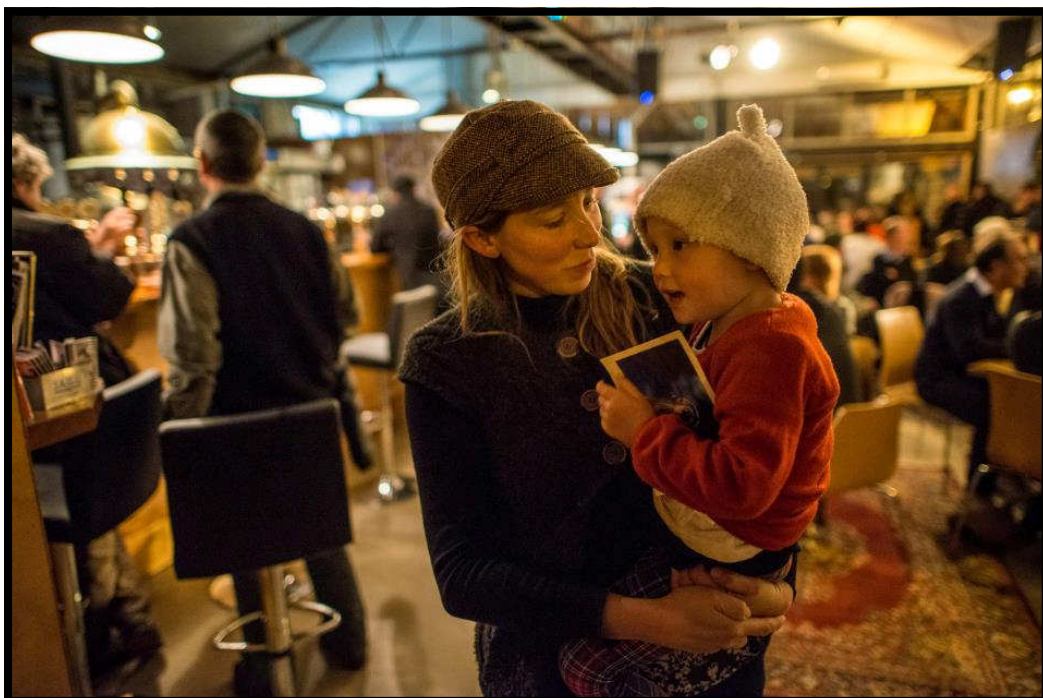
Instantly Lottie became a volunteer for Project Lyttelton working in the garden, helping at the Farmers Market, facilitating meetings, brainstorming ideas and joining the board. The couple then spent a few months away and had an awesome stint living at Bergli Farm Teddington and then Olive who is nearly three was born and the rest is history.

Project Lyttelton is really lucky to have such an inspiring younger person leading it through the next stage of development. Prior to coming to New Zealand, Lottie had quite a bit of experience working in Not for Profit groups. Sommerset House Trust, an arts organisation, saw her involved in organising festivals and coordinating community spaces. She also worked for the Royal National Institute for the Blind where she was lucky enough to administer a \$1 million pound Lotteries Grant that helped transform the volunteer management programme of the organisation.

Lottie is currently focused on Project Lyttelton becoming more financially sustainable after having just completed a course on Social Entrepreneurship. With new ideas for the Farmers Market, Garage sales, an online shop plus a myriad of other ideas she is developing projects to improve finances, employ more people and contribute more to the Lyttelton community as well as inspiring and managing all existing staff.

With her drive and enthusiasm Project Lyttelton is forging ahead as it experiments with what is possible for a community organisation to achieve.

Pat Unger was born in the Waikato and shifted south to Christchurch with her husband and four sons in 1967. From 1975-76 she attended Christchurch Polytech, completing a two-year Graphic Design course. Her tutors were Barry Cleavin, Neil Dawson, Carl Sydow and Michael Read. She then attended the University of Canterbury, and in 1979 gained a Diploma of Fine Arts [Painting]. Her lecturers included W. A. Sutton, Doris Lusk, Don Peebles and Ted Bracey.

From 1986 to 1993, Pat was art critic for *The Press*, and art commentator for *Art New Zealand* and *Preview*, a journal of the Canterbury Society of Arts, CSA [now CoCA]. During this period she enjoyed time with W. A. Sutton and was invited by him to co-author *W. A. Sutton, painter*, published in 1994.

Pat was one of three essayists for the catalogue for *W. A. Sutton. A Retrospective*, which was one of several inaugural exhibitions in the new Christchurch Art Gallery in 2003. She wrote *Bill's Story: A Portrait of W. A. Sutton*, published in 2008 and made much use of Sutton's archival material, held in the Christchurch Art Gallery's Library. Her latest book is *An Italian Sojourn: Watercolours, diaries and letters of W. A. Sutton*, published in 2012.

Storm Water Drainage Survey

Over the next few months, Council contractors will be checking out the Port Hills storm water network to assess the impact of land damage with a view to prioritising and making repairs. Teams of two are carrying out the survey in residential areas from Lyttelton to Governors Bay and may need to enter private properties to check drains, culverts and watercourses. The findings will help prioritise work to reduce any risk of erosion and flooding arising from damage to the network. Lyttelton/Mt Herbert Community Board recommended this assessment be carried out in the Lyttelton Community Recovery Plan Volume 2 and repairs to the network will contribute significantly to the Board's objective "Lyttelton Harbour catchment water quality steadily improving" by helping reduce the volume of sediment entering the harbour.

Strengthening Communities Fund Decisions Made

Difficult decisions were made by Lyttelton/Mt Herbert Community Board at its August meeting where applications for community projects totalling \$132,220 had to be considered from a pool of just \$38,398. After some discussion the following funding was allocated:

Project Lyttelton	\$5,000	Walking Festival

The Lyttelton Mt Herbert Community Board also set aside smaller amounts to fund Neighbourhood week at the end of October, the *On Board* newsletter and next year's Anzac ceremonies in Lyttelton and Diamond Harbour. The Whakaraupo Carving school received \$15,000 from a Metropolitan Fund in recognition of the fact that many of its students come from other parts of the city. The Lyttelton/Mt Herbert Small Grants Committee met on 23 August 2012 to allocate \$11,946 to local projects needing funding up to \$5,000.

Transport Matters

It is transport planning season. The Lyttelton Mt Herbert Community Board has recently made submissions on the Regional Public Transport Plan and the Christchurch Transport Plan. In general the Board supports maintaining or improving bus services, investigating the use of the existing rail infrastructure for a commuter link between the port and town and, as always, we stress the importance of the Diamond Harbour Ferry for the social and economic wellbeing of both Lyttelton and the communities on the south side of Lyttelton Harbour. All Board submissions can be viewed on the Council's website. Staff from Environment Canterbury reassured the community board that no changes to the Diamond Harbour ferry service were planned at this stage.

Community Board Clinics

Lyttelton/Mt Herbert Community Board members hold a regular informal "clinic" session at the big table in the Lyttelton Library. Come and meet them to discuss any issue of community interest or concern. Board members answer questions and provide updated information on Community Board business. The clinics are usually held on the second Thursday of each month from 5pm until the Library closes at 6pm. Upcoming clinic will be on Thursday 11 October. See you there!

Banks Peninsula Zone Implementation Plan

Tena koutou. It has been brought to my attention that there is some concern within the Whakaraupo community in relation to the consultation and public input into the process surrounding the input of Whakaraupo issues during the development of the Banks Peninsula Zone Implementation Plan (ZIP).

As a community representative on the Banks Peninsula Zone Committee my understanding of the process is:

- The Zone committee identified the zone priorities through workshops and holding three public workshops, one being held in Whakaraupo at Living Springs. These meetings were advertised in the local paper, and have been completed.
- Public meetings are held once a month, and are advertised prior to each meeting. Delegations are encouraged to assist the zone representatives within the workshops. Whakaraupo community members have presented at these meetings. These presentations have been considered within the workshops and feedback opportunities.
- The last public meeting and workshop to develop the draft Zone Implementation Plan for consultation was held at Rapaki on Tuesday 18 September 2012. The priorities for that workshop covered coastal environments.
- On the completion of the first draft Zone Implementation Plan the public are invited to provide feedback on the recommendations made in the draft ZIP. It is important at this point for us as a committee to ensure that feedback is provided.
- There are seven chapters in the ZIP including: water supply; biodiversity; Lake Wairewa; wastewater, run-off / contamination and waterways; coastal; and education, communication.

Community input is vital. The committee have produced the draft with input from the initial public workshops, and at each monthly Zone meeting. The draft Zone Implementation Plan will be presented at public meetings where the public can comment in person or send in their feedback. Public feedback will be considered and the ZIP will be updated before it moves on to be presented to Council and to be included into the draft regional plan, at which time the process of public consultation starts again. While the committee has been working on the draft Zone Implementation Plan it has been available on the Council web site and would encourage you to use it. I look forward to working with you during the feedback process.

The Power of Friendship

Here's a true story you can't help but love. In 2008, researchers conducted an experiment involving 34 students, who they fitted with weighted backpacks and took to the bottom of a steep hill. The students were asked to look at the hill and estimate how steep it was. Some participants stood next to friends during the exercise, whilst others were asked to stand alone.

And the result? The students who stood with friends uniformly gave lower estimates of the steepness of the hill. What's more, the longer the friends had known each other, the less steep the hill appeared.

And so, from a fairly simple experiment, a profound truth emerges. If you have a hill to climb in your life [and at some point, we all do] then try to climb it with a friend by your side. They will help to make you more optimistic about the climb, the journey will be easier, and you will almost certainly be happier.
