Grand Opening: Godley House Memorial Walkway

One of the best kept secrets in Diamond Harbour, known mainly to those who walk the Cliff Track [another well kept Diamond Harbour secret] is an enchanted little valley known as Te Ara Reserve.

Upon first discovering the Te Ara Reserve many think it must be private property, landscaped and whimsically adorned with a gazebo, wishing well, benches, gnomes and other curios – not to mention a mini-golf course! It is in fact council land, open to all, which has been lovingly transformed it into a magical valley by Dennis Collins.

When Godley House was demolished, Dennis began a further transformation to create the Godley House Memorial Walkway from its bricks and other demolition materials, including signs and memorabilia.

The grand opening of the Godley House Memorial Walkway will take place on Sunday November 11 at 1.00pm -4.00pm.

To celebrate the occasion, Annie Baxter will return to make her famous Victorian Afternoon Teas, the Diamond Harbour Singers will entertain, poets will give readings to inaugurate the Poets Corner, the Purau Farmers Market and others will have stalls.

Are you still wondering where this secret valley is hidden? It runs from the Cliff Track up to Marine Drive [between the eastern end of Ranui Crescent and the western end of Te Ara Crescent]. It can also be reached by steps from Te Ara Cres [refer map].

If you are driving around from Lyttelton, look for the sign on your left, just before the Fire Station. Or come over on the Diamond Harbour ferry, walk up the road a hundred metres to a track on your right leading down to the little beach. Cross the beach and continue along the Cliff Track for a kilometre to the Te Ara Cres via Ashley Reserve sign post. You've arrived!

Lyttelton Farmers Market Moves to London Street

Lyttelton's Recovery to be Given Boost by Market Move

The Lyttelton Farmers Market will move to London Street from 17 November, in a move to support local businesses and aid recovery.

Project Lyttelton [who run the market] have partnered with the Lyttelton Harbour Business Association to move the Farmers Market onto London Street for a period of between two and five years. The aim is to bring increased foot traffic to the main street and a weekly injection of music and vibrancy to support those local businesses that survived the quake or are starting to return.

The Lyttelton Farmers Market, which has been running for seven years, also suffered in the quakes, it had to move premises to the significantly smaller lower playground at Lyttelton Main School. Reduced space has seen the market turning away seasonal and potential new stall holders, limiting its ability to grow and develop.

The move to London Street will see the main street closed to traffic each and every Saturday allowing for new stall holders, entertainment and a busker's arena to join the existing set up of regular stall holders and local musicians. Saturday 17 November will see the Farmers Market launch with a carnival atmosphere and special entertainment to celebrate a step forward for Lyttelton.

Lottie Harris, Lyttelton Farmers Market Manager said: "this is a great step forward for the market and for Lyttelton. With the move to London street we can grow the market and increase its appeal to visitors, we can create a destination event each week and in so doing help support our local businesses as well as create a fun and vibrant event to be enjoyed by the whole community – it's a win win for everyone and we are very excited!"


Andrew Turner, Chairperson of the Lyttelton Harbour Business Association says "the Farmers Market moving to London Street is great news. This will really help Lyttelton put itself back on the map and will be the economic shot in the arm that our local businesses need. This move is exciting – it will make Lyttelton a real attraction on Saturday morning, and we can't wait to welcome the crowds".

Lois Ogilvie, ex-Volcano Café and now of the Volcano Market, one of the stalls at the Lyttelton Farmers Market said "it's wonderful that we are able to put the Lyttelton Farmers' market on London Street, in the heart of the community where it belongs. For me it's been exciting working towards this, and now, actually seeing it take place. Everyone in Christchurch should come and see us."

The move is being made possible with support from Recover Canterbury, The Tindall Foundation and a huge number of volunteer hours from local residents and business owners.

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Lyttelton Tunnel Control Building

NZTA Seeks CERA Demolition

The New Zealand Transport Agency says the badly quake damaged Lyttelton Tunnel Control building has been classified as dangerous and it has asked the Christchurch Earthquake Authority CERA to demolish the building.

The building is a registered Historic Building under the Historic Places Act and identified as a Category 1 Heritage Structure in the Christchurch City District Plan. Both the September 2010 and February 2011 earthquakes caused serious structural damage to the building resulting in it being "red stickered."

NZTA Highways Operations Manager Pete Connors says the full demolition of the building will be carried out under the powers of the CERA Act 2011. A start date for demolishing the building will be decided by CERA with the cost of the work being met by the New Zealand Transport Agency [NZTA].

Mr Connors says while the NZTA understands that the news will disappoint some, the agency had only made the decision after a full investigation of all feasible options. A report commissioned by the NZTA in 2011 put the cost of repairing the existing building at more than \$3.5 m greater than constructing a new fit for purpose one. "Because the current building is classified as dangerous and is in the path of potential rock falls, as the owner the NZTA as could no longer put this tough decision off."

Mr Connors said the agency appreciates the existing building's heritage value and had worked for over a year with the Historic Places Trust on various options for retaining it, but the costs were simply too high, and the agency had to balance those costs against the need to invest in the rebuild of the city."

Mr Connors said the NZTA would build a new tunnel control building that reflects both the heritage of the tunnel location and the nature of the current control building designed by the late Peter Beaven. This new purpose built structure will be located away from the rock fall path that the existing tunnel control building is now in following the February 2011 earthquake.

Historical Significance

The building of the Lyttelton Road Tunnel Administration Building, one of many major public works undertaken through New Zealand in the 1960s, was of major historical significance to the South Island and to Canterbury. A direct link from the plains to the port had been sought since the arrival of the first Canterbury settlers in December, 1850 and completion of the tunnel was a milestone in the province's transport history. The necessary Tunnel Administration Building was a key component of this project, is the most dominating visible feature and is of equal historic importance. 

Thankfully the financial year of 2011/12 hasn't been quite as dramatic as our previous year. The Port-A-Com is serving us well but we all long for the time to move back into our old space and have more room.

Things are still very quiet on the visitor front but we continue to play a vital role providing our local community with information and giving people a place to come and chat, borrow books, pick up books and collect things. It's great that we continue to share the space with the TimeBank and are also able to help out our Civil Defence friends more by providing them with accounting services.

In partnership with Professionals Real Estate, the Lyttelton Review continues to be our biggest contribution to life in Lyttelton. Readership has grown considerably. We now have 823 direct subscribers plus print 50 hard copies per week for the elderly who don't have computers. We get nothing but compliments for this work and we know we have kept the township informed about vital issues relevant to the recovery and community life. As an added bonus people who appreciate our work have been giving us donations. This has helped fill the gap of no membership money.

A new initiative for the year was the garage sale fundraisers. Thanks to Project Lyttelton we have been able to book the garage sale and collect the proceeds to help fund the centre. This just gives us small sums to use for additional advertising or other projects that we need funding for.

As always without the support of our donors we would not be operating. Sincere thanks to the Christchurch City Council who maintained our grants for this financial year and have also agreed to keep funding us into the future. That feels really good. The Canterbury Community Trust continues its stead fast support and the Community Organisation Grants Scheme from the DIA also continues to help us out. A new funder this year has been Internet NZ. Their support will enable this community access to free Wifi in London Street for three years.

The centre is really grateful to everyone who works as volunteers to keep things running. This year we have a few new customer service volunteers, Dawn Cowan and John Thacker. It's great to see new people wanting to join our team. A big thank you to existing volunteers; Emma who works every weekend, Kerry who works every Tuesday, Kay, Julie and Maureen for Wednesdays and Andrea on Fridays. We have also been helped by a team of reserves who fill in when people are on holidays.

Thank you to our Board of Trustees: Andrew for your diligent work as our Secretary and liaison with the Community Board and LHBA; Lynnette for your amazing work with the Review, web site and promotional material; Ann for popping in and out and liaison with the Community Board; Karen for running the garage sales; Belinda and Glen for all the cheque signing; and Flo for just keeping an eye on things. A thank you to Nicky Sarson for stepping up to do the accounts. It's great to have such a nice team of people around. Also a big welcome to John and we all look forward to working with you and getting to know Governors Bay better.

The Lyttelton Harbour Information Centre continues to be a key organisation in the life of Lyttelton and the surrounding harbour. I am really proud how flexible and able we are to adapt to the needs of our community.

Lyttelton Classic Boat Parade and Regatta

Purau Bay | November 10, 2012

The Lyttelton Classic Boat Parade and Regatta is a new Classic Boat event to be held at Purau Bay this weekend. This is not a competitive event with prizes for races or for individual boats.

It is an opportunity for classic and replica boats to participate in a sail past parade and enjoy an afternoon on the water that will be a spectacle for participants and spectators alike. Now there is only five days until this special event and organisers are expecting a memorable and colourful occasion with a wide range of sailing and motor craft on the water; large and small with some over 100 years old.

The Boat Parade commences at 1.00pm and will be followed by the sailing and motoring events.

The best viewing will be from the Diamond Harbour – Purau Road, but parking on the roadside is very limited. Extra parking is available adjacent to the beach in Purau Bay or on the outskirts of Diamond Harbour settlement. Organisers say they have ordered brilliant weather for the day but if that does not eventuate, and a cancellation is necessary, a message will be emailed to all participants by 9.00am, and unfortunately there will be no alternative date.

The event is being run on behalf of all classic boat lovers in Canterbury and from further afield, with the kind assistance of Mike Rossouw [Jack Tar Sailing] and Doug George [Purau Mooring Association].

Parade of Boats at 1.00pm The parade will be in the form of a sail past in the vicinity of Purau Jetty. Boats will be expected to assemble to the south of the jetty adjacent to a line of yellow buoys. When directed all boats will motor or sail past the jetty at 40m spacing's in a northerly direction out of the bay. The parade line and spacing will allow the commentator to announce each boat's history which will have been supplied with its entry.

Rock stabilisation work will be undertaken around the Christchurch Gondola, below the Summit Road from 5th November 2012 to 5th December 2012. The timeframe may be subject to change.

You may hear the sound of drilling and explosives as part of this work. Loose rock will be rolled into the valley above the Gondola base station.

Please note that the Summit Road is closed and Scott's Track, above the Gondola base station is closed. There is no access permitted to the public due to the multiple hazards present on this site.

Banks Peninsula Receives Biodiversity Funding

Environment Canterbury announced today that it had recently allocated \$112,500 to a range of important biodiversity projects throughout Canterbury.

Biodiversity Team Leader Jo Abbott says the 13 projects will protect and enhance a variety of ecosystem types, and help achieve the goals of the Canterbury Water Management Strategy. "Projects include native plantings, weed and pest control and stock proof fencing. They cover dry land reserves, hill country catchments, lowland streams, wetlands and native vegetation remnants," Dr Abbott said.

Funding was awarded as part of the implementation of the Canterbury Biodiversity Strategy. The Environment Canterbury Biodiversity Fund covers initiatives designed to protect the region's biodiversity and ecosystem health. Dr Abbott said the quality of applications in the recent funding round was extremely good, with many receiving high ecological scores. "This means it is very worthwhile protecting the areas that are the subject of the applications," she said.

One of the projects involves stock proof fencing on a Port Hills property. "This steep and rugged property has had thirty years of planting and weed control put into it by the owners and is now naturally regenerating as birds bring in new seeds from nearby sources," Dr Abbott said. "It's a great example of how dedication and passion can make a real difference to ecosystem health. The project will also be protected through a Banks Peninsula Conservation Trust covenant, the first on the Port Hills."

Background

Environment Canterbury allocates \$400,000 per year to a range of important biodiversity projects across the Canterbury region, implementing the Canterbury Biodiversity Strategy. This money is in addition to Immediate Steps biodiversity funding and is targeted towards the highest priority actions aimed at protecting and restoring the region's biodiversity. These projects will protect and enhance a variety of ecosystem types, including wetlands, lowland streams and native vegetation remnants. Projects include native plantings, weed control, pest and stock proof fencing.

Volunteers for Study on Effects of Canterbury Earthquakes

University of Otago, Department of Psychological Medicine, are seeking volunteers for a study on the effects of the Canterbury earthquakes. They are interested in including people who have had loss or hardship as a result of the earthquakes [such as loss or difficulties at work or home, death or injury of family or friend], or who witnessed the effects of the earthquakes, such as being in the city centre and seeing fallen buildings or injured people, yet have felt able to cope with these events and effects.

The study will involve assessment of psychological responses, verbal memory and emotional processing, and measurement of stress hormones and heart rate variability. They are interested in how these and other factors such as past mental health and severity of exposure to the earthquakes or difficulties as a result of the earthquakes may relate to the severity of psychological responses after a major event such as the earthquakes.

Poor Paint Wash Practices Lead to Fines

Environment Canterbury recently issued two infringement notices due to paint from rinsing brushes, rollers and other painting equipment being washed into a stream or onto land where it could enter a waterway. Each infringement notice carries with it a \$750 fine. "We are beginning to see an emerging issue associated with the huge increase in house repairs and this serves as a warning to those in the painting industry as well as to others handling painting equipment that they need to wash out their gear in a responsible manner," says Environment Canterbury Regional Manager RMA Monitoring and Compliance, Brett Aldridge.

"It is important that all people carrying out painting, plastering and concreting work, especially as part of the rebuild effort, understand their obligations and how to dispose of the wash water appropriately to protect streams and rivers. All of Christchurch's storm water drains, streams and creeks eventually flow into the Avon (Otakaro) and Heathcote Rivers (Opawaho), or the estuary, or harbour, and these are highly valued by Christchurch residents. Paint and wash water must be disposed of to the sewer or trade waste system, otherwise if discharged into streams it could kill fish and invertebrates. The Christchurch City Council will provide advice and assistance to organise this.

Mr Aldridge explains that people or companies caught discharging wash-down water into streams or onto land where it could get into a stream can expect to receive infringement fines. "If we discover people repeatedly offending, prosecution is the likely end result. If they are found guilty, offenders face penalties that are potentially very significant."

Environment Canterbury's Pollution Prevention Team is working with the painting industry, especially those involved in the Christchurch rebuild effort, by providing advice on how to dispose of all trade waste, including the clean-up of paint equipment properly, and in an environmentally appropriate way.
