Farmers Market Adds Vibrancy to London Street

Project Lyttelton and Lyttelton Harbour Business Association Recovery Strategy

Thanks to a collective group of passionate Lyttelton volunteers, this weekend the Lyttelton Farmers Market will be trading from London Street - bringing the township alive with music, entertainment, market goodness and so much more. As Lyttelton's main street closes to vehicle traffic bright and early at 7.30am on Saturday morning, a team of volunteers and market vendors will transform the street into an exciting, vibrant and unique market experience.

Established in September 2005 the Lyttelton Farmers Market began trading from the Lyttelton supermarket car park, before moving to the upper playground at Lyttelton Main School where it has remained for several years. Unfortunately damage to the school retaining walls occurred during the February 2011 earthquake, and the market moved down to the lower playground, with approximately thirty percent less space than before. Toward the end of 2011 there was a plan to relocate the market to the Lyttelton Port Company car park on Norwich Quay, but damage to the four storey building meant the move never proceeded.

Relocating the Lyttelton Farmers Market to London Street is the result of several months hard work made possible through the efforts and skills of numerous volunteers lead by an alliance between Project Lyttelton and the Lyttelton Harbour Business Association. At first glance it seems an unlikely alliance, merging the ideals of sustainability with a business comes first intellect. Lottie Harris, Project Lyttelton and Lyttelton Farmers Market Manager, says “it has been brilliant working with the Lyttelton Harbour Business Association, a great collaboration that we hope we can replicate on other projects in the future”. This unique collaboration is further endorsed by Andrew Turner, Chairperson Lyttelton Harbour Business Association, as he explains “this was a perfect example of focus and achievement as each group was able to utilise their respective networks, passion and skills to deliver this outcome for Lyttelton. Both groups realise that the Lyttelton Farmers Market has far reaching social and economic benefits for the Lyttelton community and the wider area. It was great to be able to work with Project Lyttelton on this project, and they were keen to support the views of local business owners.”

Ultimately the markets relocation to London Street is about building a stronger community and being able to rebuild Lyttelton through revitalised energy. In the past the Lyttelton Farmers Market has been credited with giving confidence to others to invest in Lyttelton, including: Freemans, Ground, Coffee Culture, Lyttelton Coffee Lounge, to name but a few. Based on this precedent alone the Lyttelton economy will be enhanced with the markets relocation as increased foot traffic and activity will support existing local businesses. But more than that, says Andrew Turner, this move is about “inspiring development and creating an atmosphere to encourage new investment in Lyttelton. Lyttelton needs investment in commercial land, new buildings to be constructed with more lease space to be made available, and to encourage new people not currently involved in Lyttelton before the earthquakes, to see the tangible benefits of investing in our future township.”

And while the initiative sounds like a perfect plan to help Lyttelton move forward, the process in making it all happen has been less than ideal. There is no doubt that frustration over red tape compliance has created a number of challenges for the team behind this project, with the view from authorities often quoted as “business as usual”. Yet accordingly to Andrew Turner “Lyttelton needed an exceptional solution to an exceptional situation. Business as usual was never going to work”.

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It was this approach that led to the forming of a working party, comprised of business owners and local residents, each passionate about the Farmers Market and working collaboratively, to encourage the authorities to think positively about this recovery initiative. Andrew adds that "each volunteer in the group was able to call upon the networks available to them so that the Christchurch City Council could gain a wider understanding of the challenges facing Lyttelton. In the end, Council staff actively worked with us, especially on traffic management plans and compliance. The decision the Christchurch City Council has made to support Lyttelton in this initiative is unprecedented. While markets on main streets are common place across Europe, few towns in New Zealand will close their main streets every Saturday".

But red tape hasn't been the only obstacle in ensuring a smooth transition to London Street. As Lottie Harris informs us "the investment costs are huge. From traffic management plans to road closure signage and electrical equipment, the list goes on and on. It has been a huge relief to receive support from Recover Canterbury and The Tindall Foundation, as the move would not have been financially possible without this support."

And leaving the Lyttelton Main School has not been an easy decision for Project Lyttelton either, as Lottie Harris further explains "it has been an incredibly tough decision to leave the school after so many years. The Farmers Market has loved being there but with the earthquakes shifting the market into the smaller playground and the school rebuild ever looming on the horizon, we just had to look for a viable alternative for the future security of the market. We have had a good chat to Sue Walls, Principal Lyttelton Main School, as Project Lyttelton wants to continue to support the school in any way it can, and we are still talking about several ideas. We are hoping to have a number of twilight markets back at the school with the first being pre Christmas, so watch this space!"

Relocating to London Street will allow the Lyttelton Farmers Market the opportunity to expand with new market vendors and more seasonal vendors expected to trade over the coming weeks. Vendors from the Lyttelton Farmers Market have also mentioned that Lyttelton and Christchurch residents have remained loyal to the market, with new customers coming through the tunnel each week. Some vendors are looking to expand their current ranges now that they will have more space available to them. Liz from Real Fresh Fish is one such vendor, who will be taking up more space to offer seafood chowder and fish sandwiches.

Lottie Harris also reveals that there will be "some exciting new editions to the wonderful regular stall holders. Applications from new stall holders are still coming in and each one is being carefully considered by the Farmers Market Advisory Group, it certainly isn't a free for all. The market is looking for stalls to compliment what is already available. So far, new stalls confirmed include: Locally made fresh mozzarella and feta; Thai food to take away and eat on the day ie: sauces, pad Thai curries; Mariano's Chorizo and Spanish fare; Stewart Island Smoked Salmon; an additional local grower; Fresh salads and tarts; and Yuletide logs and Christmas treats."

But that's not all. Live music and a busker's arena will be focal points within with Farmers Market on London Street. This week Devilish Mary and the Holy Rollers and Run-Around-Sue will be performing – so the music is going to be amazing! Then, Indiana Jane will be performing her rope tricks in the busker's arena; there will be a roaming clown with helium balloons and animal balloons twisted and created for the children; and as Lottie Harris add in "hopefully some other surprises too!"

And, in expressing the views of the market traders, Lois Ogilvie from Volcano says "it's wonderful that we are able to put the Lyttelton Farmers' market on London Street, in the heart of the community where it belongs. It has been exciting working towards this, and now, actually seeing it take place. Everyone in Christchurch should come and see us."

We couldn't agree more.


So, c'mon on over to Lyttelton: we're back up and running, and look forward to seeing you real soon.

Sir Miles Donates Treasured Garden to City

Ohinetahi Charitable Trust



A world-renowned house and garden in Governors Bay has today been gifted to the people of New Zealand. Architect Sir Miles Warren announced he has created the Ohinetahi Charitable Trust for his famous Governors Bay property, to preserve it for New Zealanders and tourists.

The property, founded in 1865, features a garden and park of national significance, along with a historic building that has been extensively repaired since the September 2010 earthquake. The building also houses Warren's personal art collection.

"Ohinetahi features a beautiful garden and park on an historic location. The restoration of the house and addition of the gallery mean that property now holds a unique position in the New Zealand landscape," Miles said in a statement to media last week. "Having owned the property for some time I now think that it is important to secure the property for future generations of New Zealanders."

Family Health Column: Hay Fever



Hay fever can mean misery for many people, with allergic symptoms of itchy eyes, runny nose, sniffles and sneezes, headaches and coughing being hard to ignore. Hay fever is a very common problem at this time of year, not only because flowers and grasses are blooming and releasing pollen but because it is also the windy season with pollen being blown about everywhere.

Hay fever [also called allergic rhinitis] develops in some people because of an over active immune system. This causes them to have allergic reactions to certain substances in the environment, generally called allergens or 'triggers'. Pollens from flowers, grasses, trees and weeds are the most common allergens. People who get hay fever at this time of year have what is known as seasonal allergic rhinitis.

However not everyone with hay fever reacts to pollen only at springtime. Many people suffer from hay fever symptoms year-round. They are sensitive to animal dander [dead skin cells from their pets], mould, and the house dust mite – a microscopic animal that lives in the millions in our pillows, bedding, curtains and carpets. In addition, cigarette smoke, chemical fumes and dusts in certain workplaces, and sudden temperature changes can make hay fever symptoms worse by irritating an already-sensitive nose or eyes.

Many hay fever sufferers also have other allergic conditions like asthma, eczema and food allergies - because of their over-active immune systems. The good news is that hay fever symptoms sometimes can be prevented and, usually, can be well-controlled. Effective treatments are available, but trying to avoid the things that 'trigger' your hay fever symptoms is a good first step. Ask us about the Hay fever fact card which has plenty of self care tips for avoiding pollens and other allergens.

If avoiding 'triggers' is not possible, we can advise you on the best medications or natural remedies to use.

Rinsing kits

These have always been very popular, and are very simple to use. The modern version is called sinus rinse. This is used to rinse out the allergens/triggers from the nose anything from a number a of times daily, to weekly.

Antihistamines [mild-moderate hay fever]

This is the easiest and often best place to start, there are many different antihistamines to choose from. The strongest ones which we keep behind the counter can make you sleepy and may affect your ability to drive. We can advise on the best one for you. Antihistamines help with runny noses, itchy throats and ears, and sneezing symptoms. The most convenient way for most people is to swallow a tablet. These are what we recommend if you have runny eyes, nose, itchy throat and skin. If it just one of these symptoms such as runny eyes, it is better to use antihistamine eye drops.

The Strong Stuff [moderate to severe hay fever]

Steroidal nasal sprays such as Telnase and Flixonase which are helpful for people with moderate-to-severe hay fever, normally those whom an antihistamine does not completely fix. It is also helpful for those who get hay fever symptoms all year round. Steroid nasal sprays take a few days to work to full effect and should be used regularly, even when symptoms are not present. They can be used for prevention but to be effective for this, they have to be started before you are in contact with the allergen.

If the nose is still blocked, other medicines can be used, such as decongestant nasal sprays, eye drops or tablets - but only for a few days at a time otherwise you will have to ween yourself off or the nose or eye will block up or run badly for a few days.

Natural remedies

Bells Pharmacy have a number of products from homeopathic to herbal such as hay fever and sinus relief, this is a capsule containing garlic, horseradish and other sinus active herbs with a soothing marshmallow to help you symptoms. Celebrating the Tradition of Christmas

Christmas Stamps have also arrived at Bells Pharmacy. You can also now purchase discounted international stamp books: buy 9 stamps get 1 free - applies to \$1.90 and \$2.40 stamps only.

For thousands of years people around the world have reflected on the Nativity story at Christmas time, and this traditional story is told through New Zealand's Christmas 2012 stamps. The five gummed stamps in this years issue are a beautiful reminder of the meaning behind Christmas, and the reason we all celebrate with friends and family on 25 December. The stamps have a uniquely New Zealand touch, with a pōhutukawa motif framing each of the intricately illustrated images.

Each of the Christmas stamps tells part of the Nativity story. The 70c stamp shows Mary and Joseph with the newborn baby Jesus, and the \$1.40 stamp features the shepherds who were tending their flocks nearby. The angel of the Lord who shared the news of Jesus's birth is shown on the \$1.90 stamp, and the \$2.40 and \$2.90 stamps show the three wise men travelling to worship Jesus, and presenting him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

Three self-adhesive stamps are also available in denominations of 70c, \$1.90 and \$2.40.


